

The Towns County Lady Indians came as close as they've come in the 17 years of their Battle of the States Christmas Basketball tournament to staking claim to the championship of their own holiday event.

The Lady Indians fell victim to a late scoring surge by the Gordon Lee Lady Dragons and finished with a second place trophy, losing the title game 62-48.

Leading the Lady Indians in scoring for the game were Jordan Moss with 22 points, Ben Pong with 8, Eryn Cochran with 7, and Lindsay Patton with 6 while Cochran led in assists with 3 according to your reporter's unofficial tally.

Lady Indians' senior Moss and freshman Cochran were named to the All-Tour-

day tournament, of which the start was moved from Dec. 27 to Dec. 28 due to inclement weather.

The Lady Indians advanced to the tournament's championship round with victories over Hayesville and Union County. The Lady Indians claimed a 58-34 win over the Lady Jackets in their tournament opener.

Cornwell was murdered; Carringer prime suspect

The Georgia Bureau of Investigation believes a Towns County man took a horrific secret with him to his grave last year. On Monday in Cleve-

land, the GBI's top officer named James Scott Carringer the strongest suspect in the Aug. 11, 2009 abduction and murder of 38-year-old Kristi Leigh Cornwell.

Vernon Keenan, the GBI's director, held a news conference at GBI Headquarters in White County to discuss the weekend discovery of Kristi Cornwell's remains in rural Union County near the North Carolina border.

Carringer, 42, who was co-owner of The Appraisal Agency in Young Harris, is phone pinged a cell tower in the strongest suspect in connection with the abduction



James Scott Carringer and murder of Kristi Cornwell, authorities said. Georgia Bureau of In-

vestigation spokesman John Bankhead revealed that on the night Kristi Cornwell disappeared, Carringer was within a two-mile radius of the wooded area where her remains were found in a shallow grave on a rural trail

in Union County. Carringer's cell phone records indicate that his cell

SPLOST on March 15 ballot

Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall has scheduled a Jan. 13 meeting at the Towns County Courthouse to discuss an intergovernmental agreement with the cities of Hiawassee and Young Harris for the purpose of holding a Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax referendum.

That meeting will be held at 11 a.m. in the Courthouse and the public is invited to attend.

Commissioner Kendall said Monday that the SPLOST referendum will be on the March 15 ballot during a special election to determine if Towns County voters support a 1 cent spe- proceeds to begin develop-

cial tax to support capital improvement projects in the county and in Hiawassee and Young Harris.

From the county's perspective, Commissioner Kendall if the SPLOST is approved by voters, he intends to use the county's

ment of the Ralph and Johnnie Foster Memorial Park. That project includes the construction of a multipurpose community center, the commissioner said.

"One of the biggest items in the SPLOST is developing Foster Memorial Park and constructing a multipurpose building for use as a community center," he said. "Also, the cities will have some important projects."

The commissioner also intends to acquire 30,000 gallons of sewer capacity for the county from the city of Hiawassee by using \$150,000 in SPLOST funds to upgrade the wastewater treatment plant. That \$150,000 will be used to

Union fire was arson; suspect hangs self in jail

A state medical examiner's report shows proof positive that Joseph Leroy Powell and Chad Derek Marshall didn't die from fire-related causes in Union County on Dec. 23.

Rather, the medical examiner's report shows that the two men died from repeated gunshots from a .45 caliber handgun.

The man believed to have killed them delivered a personal brand of justice on himself, according to local and state authorities.


On Dec. 28, Cody Benjamin Norregaard, 28, of Blairsville, was taken into custody at a residence at 178 Forest Circle in Union County on numerous drug charges in that jurisdiction. While he was incarcerated in the Union County Jail, GBI Agent Dustin Hamby secured five other warrants regarding Norregaard. Those warrants ob-

tained by the North Georgia News in Blairsville included two counts of murder, burglary, first-degree arson and armed robbery related to the deaths of Powell, 62, of Blairsville, and Marshall, 38 of Young Harris.
