Last half rally lifts Lady Indians' JV past Hebron Christian

The Towns County Lady Indian JV's returned to action last Saturday at home against Hebron Christian after having their Friday game at Commerce cancelled due to weather concerns. The varsity games were moved from 7 p.m. to 5 p.m. with the JV games cancelled in order for the TCHS teams and fans to get back across the mountain prior to the expected arrival of snow to the area.

Although most members of the Lady Indian JV squad were elevated to varsity status during the Battle of the States, the Hebron game was their first as a JV team since they played at Andrews on Saturday, December 18. The Lady Indians took an early 6-0 lead highlighted by four points by Stephanie Patton but Hebron rallied for a brief 7-6 lead with 2:40 left in the first quarter. A steal and layup by Davilyn Blythe got them back ahead 8-7 at 2:17 and a McKenzi Moss free throw had them ahead 9-7 before a late Lady Lions basket tied the score at 9-9 after one

Patton struck with a field goal, two free throws and a trey in less than three minutes at the start of the third quarter for a 16-9 Lady Indian lead but the Lady Lions rallied for a 20-18 advantage with 1:23 left in the first half. Elizabeth Turner responded for the Lady Indians, however, with a field goal for a tie at 1:09 and with two free throws at 1.1 seconds for a 22-20 lead at intermission that they would not relinquish.

Four Lady Indians put points on the scoreboard in the third quarter and five turned the trick in the fourth with a five point fourth quarter by Patton

Following a snowy Christmas break, the Towns County Indians Middle School teams returned to action hosting the visiting Fannin County

Both Indian teams finished with results that mirrored the season openers in Blue

Victory went to the Lady Indians as they fended off a late Lady Rebel charge taking the opener 32-26. The Indians fell to the Rebels in the nightcap

After a lengthy delay, the Lady Indians took to the home court looking for a season sweep of the Lady Rebels. And that's exactly what they did.

In the early going, it appeared that the Lady Indians picked up where they left off. Head Coach Lana Parker's Lady Indians completely shutout the Lady Rebels in the second half of the previous meeting in Blue Ridge. Starting with a quick

opening basket from Carly Gilfilian, the Lady Indians were off and running. Misty Lindemuth put the Lady Indians up 8-0 midway through the first quarter. Lindemuth would also drop a free throw to put the Lady Indians up 11-4 to close out the opening frame.

The Lady Indians took off in the second quarter stifling a Lady Rebel rally to carry a 19-13 lead into the locker room.

Lady Rebels Head Coach Buffy Chapman and her Lady Rebels appeared determined to get back in the game, scoring an early bucket after the break. Once again Parker's girls tightened up on defense and held the Lady Rebels to one basket through the third quarter. Unable to make good on the free throws from the charity stripe led to the Lady Rebels undoing down the stretch. The Lady Indians pulled away taking the game by six 32-26.

The TCMS boys didn't fair quite as well but made definite strides of improvement compared to the previous matchup with the Rebels.

Atlanta - The Towns County Indians made their best finish ever in Area Duals as the team competed at Holy Innocents School for the right to go

They didn't make it to state, but the team did make some historic moments for the wrestling program.

On Friday, the Indians defeated state duals powerhouse Trion to advance to the second day of the double elimination tournament.

Early Saturday morning, the Indians lost a tough match to the Duals event No. 2 seed, Holy Innocents.

"As good as we wrestled yesterday (Friday), we wrestled that bad this morning in the first round," Coach Stowers said. "Holy Innocents is a great wrestling team and I think they'll give Gordon Lee all they

can handle (in the finals)." That loss to Holy Innocents sent the Indians into the loser's bracket with the chance to battle back to third place and a chance to compete at state.

Saturday afternoon, the Indians battled the Walker Wolverines. They lost a narrow battle and earned an early ticket back to Hiawassee.

"We didn't do some things today that we did yesterday and that's the difference between winning and losing," Coach Stowers said. "When you have young kids, especially a lot of first year kids and that's kind of what you get - incon-

"We had a couple matches this round that should've gone our way that didn't," he said. "We did some bonehead moves and got pinned. You can do that and win close matches. If we wrestled Walker six times it's probably 4 to 2 our favor. I'm proud of the kids, they put forth a lot of effort. I think now we understand that if we wrestle like we're supposed to wrestle,

we can beat anybody. Coach Stowers had high praise for junior Zach Stroud at

145 pounds. 'Stroud had Alec Diamond from Walker in the last round and he's the two time State Champion," Coach Stowers said. "He had him on his back and almost had him stuck there but wound up getting beat by two points. Zach went 2-1; he wrestled a really good match today. He's come a long way this year."

Coach Stowers was feeling good after the first day.

"That's the best we've wrestled all year," he said. "We've got everybody in the right weight classes. Our young kids stepped up and won some matches. Even the ones that got beat didn't get pinned.

"In a duals match meet that's critical; every point counted." he said. "We got to



