

Makeup **Days**

Towns County Schools Superintendent Dr. Richard Behrens will meet with faculty members before making a recommendation regarding snow makeup days.

Dr. Behrens said that the system has days it can use to make up for the inclement weather that has forced an additional six days to make up on the school system calendar.

In total, the school system has missed 10 days this school year due to snow and icy weather conditions. A decision on what days will be used to make up for the lost calendar days could come as early as Feb. 14, Dr.

Behrens said. "There are a lot of factors that will go into the selection of the days we use to make up for the missed inclement weather days,' Dr. Behrens said. "We'll be seeking faculty input."

Extending the school year isn't in the thought process at the moment, Dr. Behrens said.

Hiawassee Police Chief Jimmy Wright is aggressively pursuing leads in two recent burglaries at Hiawassee Hardware. The first burglary in the

"This SPLOST will take the pressure off property tax payers by funding essential capital and infrastructural projects and equipment," she said. "I am excited to know my property tax will remain the same. More exciting news is any money collected during these six years not spent on listed projects will be used to roll back property taxes."
