The large lead certainly didn't prevent the Lady Wolverines from mounting several challenges the remainder of the game but as stated by their coach as shown above, the Lady Indians would answer every time. It seems a certainty that the Lady Indians would have had losing a big lead the final quarter at home to the Lady Wolverines in last year's region championship game in the back of their minds but they did what they had to do to get the victory this time.

In building the first half lead, the Lady Indians initially had to overcome 2-0 and 5-3 Prince Avenue leads on baskets by Lindsay Patton and Makayla Underwood by the mid point of the first quarter. A free throw and field goal by Jordan Moss got them ahead 8-5 by the 3:24 mark of the first quarter and Gabby Arencibia doubled the lead with the first trey in the aforementioned run of treys for an 11-5 Towns lead at 2:15 which became 13-7 after one quarter.

The Lady Wolverines actually got a head start on the 3-pointer show at the outset of the second quarter sinking a trey before and after one by Ali Bleckley by the 6:02 mark for just a 16-13 Towns lead but here came the Lady Indians. Arencibia struck again just nine seconds later at 5:53, Bleckley again a minute later at 4:53, and Arencibia still again at 4:23 for a suddenly prominent 25-12 Lady Indian lead with the first eighteen points of the quarter having come via 3-pointers and the Lady Indians gaining a 12-6 edge in the process..

Following two free throws by the Lady Wolverines and one by Dadrian Blythe for the Lady Indians, Eryn Cochran got in on the act with a trey of her own with twenty one of the first twenty four points now coming by way of 3-pointers and the score now 29-14. Blythe then continued her good

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work with a pair of field goals wrapped around a Prince free throw for the aforementioned 33-15 Towns County lead at exactly the two minute mark. The Lady Wolverines gave a preview of what was to come after that however, as they used a putback basket and a trey during the final thirty two seconds of the quarter in reducing the lead to 33-20 at intermission.

Moss opened the third quarter with her toe on the  $\hat{3}$ -point line for a long deuce and a 35-20 Lady Indian lead but the Lady Wolverines were about to issue their first serious challenge to what had been a somewhat comfortable Towns cushion. Prince used three treys in an 11-1 run between the 7:11 and 5:13 marks for just a 36-31 Lady Indian lead. Moss responded with a field goal at 4:50 for a 38-31 score and the Lady Indians responded to a Prince basket at 3:35 with an 8-0 run the final 2:50 of the third quarter with the Lady Indians seemingly back in charge by a 46-33 score. That closing run was accomplished by a drive and left handed layup for two by Bleckley and the return of the trey ball with Arencibia sinking two at 2:27 and at thirty six seconds.

Moss opened the fourth quarter with a field goal for a 48-33 score but the Lady Wolverines struck for ten straight points, partially due to some heavy handed but uncalled defensive action, beginning with a trey and ending in a three point nine seconds for what turned play with Prince again knocking on the door. Once again the Lady Indians turned to the trey ball as the freshman Cochran squared up and nailed her second of the game from the right wing and the Lady Indians led 51-43 at 2:52.

The Lady Wolverines would sink two additional two point baskets after that but again chran with 3 each and Underthe Lady Indians would have an answer each time. Moss drove

## The Towns County Indians baseball team is out to prove the experts wrong in 2011

make it out of their region in a recent Gainesville Times high school baseball preview, the Indians will rely on senior leadership to get the job done in 2011.

The Indians finished the 2010 season at 9-14 overall with a Region 8-A record of 4-11. Head Coach Shannon Moss stepped away from the diamond to spend more time with his family. His assistant of four years, Chris Vardo steps up to take the reins of the storied Indians' baseball program.

The 2011 edition of the Towns County Indians is blessed with eight seniors to lead the way back to respectability, said Vardo, as he prepared for his first year as head baseball coach.

"We're looking forward to it," Coach Vardo said about the upcoming season. "We have eight seniors that are returning from last year. We expect good leadership and good direction from them. They're a tough group of kids, ones that we'll have to count on throughout the season.

"We have three senior pitchers that we're going to be really counting on Alan Turpin, Brett Bradshaw and Taylor Denton," Coach Vardo said. "They're going to carry us and do a pretty good job.'

Towns County's Tim Collier finished his weekend at the Gwinnett Arena as the fifth best wrestler in the 135-pound weight class of the Class A State Wrestling Championships.

Collier battled back from an opening round loss by an 11-5 decision to eventual state runner up Cole Wheeler from First Presbyterian to earn Class A fifth place recognition at 135 pounds.

Collier came back to defeat Greyson Cochran of Commerce in a 7-4 decision, before losing to Michael Harrison of Irwin County in a ultra tight 3-2 decision.


"Tim placing fifth is a great accomplishment for him," Indians Head Wrestling Coach Jeff Stowers said.

"I'm really proud of our kids they worked real hard. Tyler Hoffman (152) and Tim Collier (135) worked hard all year," Coach Stowers said. "I know that they didn't finish how the wanted it to but they wrestled hard all year long. We're very proud of their accomplishments.

Coach Stowers said that the State Tournament gets tougher and tougher every year.

"I really believe that five years ago both of these kids could've won their weight class in the State Tournament," Coach Stowers said. "Wrestling in Georgia has come so far in the last four or five years. It's just really unbelievable to watch.

Towns County's 152-pound entry Tyler Hoffman lost to eventual State Champion James Ballard of Athens Christian School in a 6-0 decision and the third
