Judge Barrett in hot water over handgun

Langley: unfortunately 'poor judgment used to make rhetorical point with a gun'

The chief Superior Court Judge of the Enotah Judicial Circuit finds himself in hot water today following a Feb. 22 incident in Lumpkin County Superior Court in which he brandished a handgun during a court proceeding.

An investigation into the courtroom conduct of Enotah Circuit Chief Superior Court Judge David Barrett is underway by the Judicial Qualifications Commission of Georgia, the Towns County Herald has

Judge Barrett reportedly pulled his personal handgun out during a joint bond hearing and temporary restraining order hearing in Lumpkin County Superior Court to make a "rhetorical point" to an uncooperative witness during the proceedings.

Georgia law allows judges to carry concealed weapons in a courtroom for their own protection.

Enotah Circuit District Attorney Jeff Langley, who was present during the incident and asked the judge to put away his weapon, which he did, said that the incident "certainly was a significant breach of conduct in the courtroom by a Superior Court judge.' 'On the other hand, I

certainly saw nothing that I would characterize as a threat or an assault upon anyone," Langley said. "But it was a firearm and it was being held in (Judge Barrett's) hand while he talked and gestured." The incident in ques-

tion happened during the bond hearing for former Hall County Sheriff's Deputy Scott Sugarman and a civil proceeding where his estranged wife sought a tem-



porary restraining order against Sugarman.

Sugarman is facing charges of rape, criminal attempt to commit rape, aggravated assault, terroristic threats and two counts of third degree cruelty to children related to a Feb. 6 family violence incident in Lumpkin County, Lumpkin County Superior Court records show.

He resigned from the Hall County Sheriff's Office on Feb. 17 after charges were filed in Lumpkin County, according to Lan-

The Towns County Herald does not reveal the identity of sexual assault victims. However, Sugarman's reasons for resigning his deputy's post and his alleged domestic assault against his wife have been wildly reported in the Northeast Georgia news media.

Attorneys for both Sugarman and his wife were present in Lumpkin County Superior Court during the joint criminal and civil hearing. Judge Barrett was presiding over the case.

The day was intended to hear arguments for the victim to receive a temporary restraining order against Sugarman. The defense attorney for Sugarman

also sought an emergency bond hearing to set bail for his client.

As a matter of efficiency, the defense attorney consented to evidence in the case being heard at the same time as the TPO hearing, Langley said.

"At that hearing, the alleged victim in the case testified. She had her own attorney present," Langley said. "At one point, she was being questioned by (her estranged husband's attorney), her attorney made a series of objections, and the witness continued to talk – over Judge Barrett and over her own attorney.

"At that point, Judge Barrett began to admonish her, that she should let her attorney do her job," Langley said. "Some people do not realize that there is a specific statute that authorizes

District Attorney Langley: criminal charges not likely

An investigation into the courtroom conduct of Enotah Judicial Circuit Senior Judge David Barrett has been opened, Circuit District Attorney Jeff Langley said on Monday.

"I am aware that there is an open investigation," Langley said, referring to a complaint about Judge Barrett brandishing his personal handgun in open court in Lumpkin County on Feb. 22.

Early voting ends Friday

Last chance to cast presidential ballot early

Early voting for the Super Tuesday" Presidential Preference Primary is drawing to a close with little fanfare in Towns County.

On Monday afternoon, only 309 votes had been cast early as the final days of early voting leading toward the Super Tuesday vote come to a close.

Early voting ends Friday, Towns County Registrar Irma Nichols said.

Early voting in person began Monday, Feb. 13th. The local polls were open on Saturday with few casting ballots from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Voters can still request

an absentee ballot through Friday, March 2.

Georgia residents must return their absentee ballot to their county election office by close of polls on Election Day, March 6.

Absentee ballots cast by overseas and military voters must be postmarked on or before March 6, but will be accepted until the end of business on March 9. Voters are not required to provide a reason when requesting an absentee ballot. The name on the Presi-

Georgia election law requires the Secretary of State to set a date for the state executive committee of each party which is to conduct a presidential preference primary to submit a list of the names of the candidates of such party to appear on the Presidential Preference Primary ballot.
