## Lady Indians Overwhelm Mt. Zion; Reach Class A Sweet 16

The Towns County Lady Indians Varsity Basketball Team continued a remarkable and historic season last Friday night in their home gym in dismantling the Mt. Zion Lady Eagles of Carroll County by a score of 67-31 in the first round of the Class A State Tournament. In so doing, the Lady Indians extended their record to 27-1 and qualified for at least the State Sweet 16 for the fourth year in a row. They are currently tied for fourth place in the Georgia Prep Country statewide Coach's Poll with Bryan County of Pembroke near Savannah.

At the conclusion of the game, the Lady Indians did not know the name of the opponent or the location of their second round game. A coin toss would be required to determine which team held home court advantage if second ranked Southwest Atlanta Christian Academy (SACA) had defeated eighth ranked Pace Academy of Atlanta in the SACA gym. It wasn't long until word got to Towns County that Pace Academy had upset SACA, the Region 9A champion, by a score of 60-54.

This left the Region 8A Champion Lady Indians as the higher seeded team over Pace Academy, the third seed from Region 5A, with Pace required to travel to Towns County for the second round game on Tuesday of this week at 6:30 p.m. The winner of this game will then travel to Marietta High School this Saturday, March 5, to face the winner of a Tuesday night game between

third ranked St. Francis of Alpharetta and the sixth ranked Darlington School of Rome on the Darlington home court. The winner of the game in Marietta will qualify for the state final four in Macon next Wednesday, March 9.

In a start typical of first round state tournament play, the Lady Indians and Mt. Zion got off to a bit of a slow start as it required nearly two and a half minutes for the visiting Lady Eagles to score the first basket of the night for a 2-0 lead. It required just eighteen seconds after that, however, for Gabby Arencibia to take a Jordan Moss pass and sink a 3-pointer at 5:14 for a 3-2 lead the Lady Indians would never surrender. Arencibia followed by taking a steal near mid court to the basket for a 5-2 Towns lead which became 9-3 on two free throws each by Lindsay Patton and Eryn Cochran and then 11-5 on a steal near mid court and layup by Ben Pong at the first quarter buzzer.

Arencibia converted an-

other steal, this time in the back court, into a lay up and then more than matched a Mt. Zion basket with a trey for a 16-7 Lady Indian lead barely a minute into the quarter. Ali Bleckley had a hot scoring hand after that, sinking two treys and two free throws between the 6:11 mark and the 4:20 mark for

a 24-9 Towns lead. Two free throws by Patton and a baseline jumper by Makayla Underwood had the Lady Indians seemingly cruising with a 28-9 lead with 3:40 remaining until intermission. The Lady Indians went cold after that, however, failing to score for the remainder of the quarter but with the Lady

Eagles only able to sink a pair of field goals themselves for a still prominent 28-13 Towns lead at the half.

Moss came alive at the start of the third quarter, scoring nine of the Lady Indians' first eleven points on a trey, 4 for 4 free throw shooting, and a drive for two by the 3:54 mark, putting the game on easy street as the Lady Indians led 39-15. They led 48-21 entering the fourth quarter and it didn't get any better after that for the Lady Eagles as the Lady Indians extended their lead in the fourth quarter for a 67-31 victory.

Scoring leaders for the game for the Lady Indians were Arencibia with 20 points, Bleckley with 14, Moss with 9, Patton with 6, and Pong and Underwood with 5 each. Leading in assists, according to your reporter's tally, were Underwood with 4 and Bleckley and Patton with 2 each. Five different Lady Indians sank at least one trey in the game for a team total of eleven with Arencibia and Bleckley leading the way with

four each. And the Lady Indians returned to a season pattern of excellent free throw shooting with fourteen for seventeen accuracy after struggling a bit at the line in the Region Semi-Finals and Finals.

The large crowd attending the Mt. Zion game was treated to an inspiring version of the National Anthem by Note-ariety, a wonderful young ladies choir conducted by TCHS Chorus Director Chris Adams. As a plug for the choir, readers can help them with expenses to a vocal competition in Boston, Massachusetts, scheduled for April 16-20 in one of two ways. Towns County's USA Wrestling team brought home two gold medals during Saturday's State Qualifier Tournament in Gilmer County.

Out of 10 Towns County wrestlers battling in the tournament, six advanced to the State Finals on Saturday in Marietta, Coach Jason Hoffman said.

Kyle Davis and Aaron Collier earned gold medals in their respective weight classes to lead the way as the team also brought home three bronze medals for their efforts.

Jonathon Owenby, Keanu Nguyen and Nick Shook finished third place in their respective weight classes. Harold Cox claimed fourth place in his weight class.

Davis, Collier, Owenby, Nguyen, Shook and Cox all qualified to advance to the State Finals held Saturday at Life University in Marietta.


