It is always difficult for followers of top athletes to see their high school careers come to an end but it becomes especially difficult when losing players reaching such high accomplishments as the 2012 Lady Indian Seniors. That is the case, however, as Gabby Arencibia, Ali Bleckley, and Lindsay Patton all saw their careers come to an end with the loss to Darlington last Tuesday. In addition, this game ended the career of senior Kindle Moss who missed the entire season after having shoulder surgery last summer with an extended recovery period preventing her from seeing any action this sea-

## Lady Indians season ends with close loss to seventh ranked Darlington

Indians Varsity Basketball Team half. Twelve of the Lady Indians came one victory short of a trip to the Elite Eight round at Marietta High School when they lost a tough battle to the Darlington School of Rome last Tuesday in the Towns County Gym. Darlington entered the game with a 26-3 record and ranked seventh in two statewide Class A polls. The Lady Indians entered with a 23-6 record and ranked ninth in the Georgia Prep Country Internet Poll.

As might be expected, the game was a real battle from start to finish with Darlington using a 12-1 start to the fourth quarter in building a twelve point lead and held off a late Lady Indians rally for the victory. The win sent Darlington to the Elite Eight round where they fell to perennial state champion Wesleyan by a 95-41 score on Saturday.

The first quarter saw each team show signs of gaining the upper hand with Darlington taking an early 6-2 lead and a late advantage of 17-12 but with the Lady Indians holding a 12-8 lead mid way through the quarter and trailing by just a 17-15 margin by quarter's end. Ali Bleckley scored seven points in the first quarter for the Lady Indians, including a trey with nine seconds left in reducing the aforementioned five points Lady Tigers advantage.

Darlington opened the second quarter with the first five points on a coast to coast run



The Lady Tigers opened the third quarter on an 8-2 run for a 38-36 lead but the two teams played on virtually even terms the remainder of the quarter with Bleckley including her third trey of the game among seven points production. Bleckley's trey gave the Lady Indians a 43-43 standoff at exactly the two minute mark and Arencibia's third trey of the game at the twelve seconds mark had them within 47-46 entering the fourth quarter.

The first five and a half minutes of the fourth quarter proved to be very difficult aforementioned 12-1 Lady Tigers run giving them a 59-47 lead and seemingly in control of the game. The Lady Indians as Stephanie Patton struck for three straight treys, interrupted only by a Darlington putback just forty two seconds of playing time between the 2:26 and 1:44 marks for just a 61-56 Lady Indians deficit.
