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Towns County High School Girls Basketball Wrap-up

The 2011 high school basketball season in Georgia is now complete so let's take a final look at a few items as related to the Towns County Lady Indians and Indians of this sea-

Class A State Championship – Although the Lady Indians fell victim to the hot shooting at the start and end of their final game in the State Sweet 16 against Pace Academy, there was an interest in the state tournament right up to the final game of the season.

The Pace Academy Girls made it all the way to the State Championship game where they fell last Saturday to a second half surge by a 65-43 score to the perennial state champion Wesleyan Lady Wolves. Pace actually held a 20-18 lead late in the second quarter before Wesleyan took a 23-20 lead at intermission and overpowered the Lady Knights the last half in taking a 65-43 victory. The loss to Pace turned

out to mark the fifth straight year that the Lady Indians have been eliminated in state tournament play by a past or present state champion or a state championship finalist. They fell by a 62-53 score in the first round of the 2007 state tournament to then defending Class A State Champion Southwest Atlanta Christian (SACA) on the Lady Warriors' home court. SACA went on to fall in that year's state final four to state champion Hawkinsville.

In 2008, the Lady Indians made it to the final four themselves where Calvary Day of Savannah pulled away from just a 40-35 lead near the three minute mark for a 50-37 victory and went on to win the state title with a win over Terrell County. And the Lady Indians

were overwhelmed by eventual Class A State Champion Wesleyan in both the state elite eight at Marietta High School in 2009 and in the Sweet 16 round at Wesleyan in 2010 before falling to this year's state runner up Pace Academy.

Elsewhere – It's always interesting to see how opposing teams compete in post season play and this year was no exception for opponents of the Lady Indians and Indians. Of course, the eighth-ranked Pace Academy Girls made the most impressive run of any opponent of either team as they defeated second-ranked Southwest Atlanta Christian 60-52 on to defeating the fourth-ranked have done during prior years.

defeated third ranked St. Francis of Alpharetta 63-60 in double overtime in the game immediately following for the trip to the state final four.

County who entered the game with a 24-6 record, including just one loss to a Class A team.

Turner had taken backto-back wins in the first two rounds of the state tournament over seventh-ranked Taylor County and then Bryan County who was actually tied for fourth with the Lady Indians in the Georgia Prep Country Coaches

The Lady Indians' only loss other than to Pace Academy was in the finals of the Battle of the States Tournament to Gordon Lee of Chickamauga who reached the Elite Eight in Class A before losing 78-43 to Wesleyan.

Among Region 8-A girls teams, third seeds Athens Christian and Hebron Christian took close wins in play-in games over Holy Innocents' and First Presbyterian of Macon but didn't fair as well in first round action as they fell to a pair of region champions, Darlington and Wilkinson County, on the winners' home courts. have to be the disappointing girls team from Region 8-A as the Lady Wolverines were beaten badly at home by Bremen who had lost a two-point game to Mt. Zion in the consolation game of the Region 6-A tourna-Of course, the Lady In-

dians crushed Mt. Zion in first round play, leaving those of us seeing Prince play well against the Lady Indians in the Region 8A Championship Game scratching our heads as to how Prince could have played so poorly against Bremen. In most cases, such re-

sults can be attributed to difficult or easy match ups for various teams with this phenomenon especially evident in Athens Christian's surprising play in game win over Holy In-The Lady Indians took

just a five point win over Holy Innocents' on the Lady Bears' home court a few weeks ago, leaving Pace Academy's long and ultra successful run a special puzzle when considering that they only defeated Holy Innocents' 36-32 in a late regular season game and then 55-50 in overtime in the Region 5A consolation game.

After losing to eventual Region 8AA Tournament Champion Rabun County on the Rabun court in the semi-finals, they avenged two one-sided losses to East Hall with a 48-41 win over the Lady Vikings in the consolation game for a third place finish in the Region 8AA Tournament.

Unfortunately, the Lady Panthers and Lady Vikings had to travel to face Greater Atlanta Christian and Buford, respectively, on their opponents' home courts in first round state tournament play. Those two teams would wind up in the Class AA State Championship game in Macon with Buford taking the state title by a 57-36 score over The Lady Panthers fell

by a 60-42 score to GAC after trailing by just 10 points midway through the fourth quarter while East Hall gave the Class AA State Champion Buford Lady Wolves their toughest competition in the five games they played in the state tourna-

East Hall led 20-19 at inquarter gave Buford a 33-22 lead and set the stage for a 55-41 victory, easily the closest margin among the five Buford wins in state tournament play.

far distant Elbert County in the County but a regular season home game to Dawson County as well, a team the Lady Indians defeated by a 10-point margin at Dawson on opening night after holding as much as a 25-point lead in the third quarter.

> The Indians' opponents for the most part did not fare as well in post season play as those of the Lady Indians. After the Indians fell victim to red hot shooting throughout the game in their opening round loss to Prince Avenue in the Region 8-A Tournament at Commerce, the Wolverines could not match their success the following night against George Walton Academy. The Wolverines scored 21 points in the first quarter and twenty in the second against the Indians but managed just four in the first six minutes against George Walton who eventually took a 73-57 win.

> George Walton made it to the region finals where they lost in overtime to the home standing Athens Christian Eagles 65-63 but was the exception among Indians opponents in doing pretty well in the state tournament. They defeated Eagle's Landing Christian Academy by before falling by just an 87-79 score to Pace Academy who, in turn, lost 85-70 to eventual Class A state champion Wilkinson County.
