Seabaugh, the lone sponsor of SB 485, determined the judgeships to be eliminated in the 16 circuits after evaluating the number of cases filed per judge.

'Those areas which only have two judges will not be reduced," Seabaugh said. "In many areas, the average workload of Superior Court judges is 3,200 cases. The judgeships to be eliminated averaged approximately 1,200 cases per judge. Those cases will be disbursed among the remaining judges in that circuit."

Seabaugh is suggesting eliminating an Enotah judgeship in a circuit that covers four counties - Towns, Union, White and Lumpkin. The circuit already has a critical backlog of cases yet to be heard between the three existing judges. "In this budget atmo-

According to Seabaugh, the 2010 Fiscal Budget is more than 7 percent lower than the 2009 budget and it is 8.5 percent lower than Gov. Perdue's original 2010 budget estimate.
