Second, there is a connection west of the city on the other end of Hwy 288 near Fodder Creek Road. Finally, there is a third connection (not far from the second one) on Hwy 288.

The authority switched from the county's well system to the Rowe Canupp plant in 1988, when the City of Hiawassee and the authority signed a 40-year
