Lady Indians rebounded on Monday from their worst defeat of 2011 with a 2-0 win over Lakeview Academy in Gainesville.

The Lady Indians, (6-3-2) now advance to the state soccer playoffs for the first time in school history.

The Lady Indians have lost only two games in their Area conference, both coming to highly ranked Athens Academy and Hebron Christian Academy.


