McBride asked for comments from some of the people in the meeting, including Towns County Sheriff Chris Clinton, who said he encourages neighborhood watch programs and keeping the public aware and energized in the fight against drugs.

Clinton also said that methamphetamine abuse is down in the county. However, the real problem now is abuse of prescription drugs. He said there have been six reported overdoses in recent months and explained how teenagers experimenting with prescription drugs can easily take too much.

Hiawassee Police Chief Jimmy Wright said he supported Clinton and wants to ork with the community in raising awareness about prescription drug abuse.

The chief's wife, Dawn Wright, works with the Enotah Family Drug Court. She said their program has been given grant money to educate and treat parents with addictions, and they hope to continue the program. She said the drug court is trying to stop the family cycle of addiction, and they do have surveillance officers who monitor families closely.

McBride said one long term goal is to bring a rehab center to the area. Right now, the closest in-patient rehab center is in Blue Ridge.

McBride said he wants to operate the Drug Free Towns County Coalition like "a business with heart.'

bor, leaving lacerations on the scalp. The neighbor was treated at the scene. Floyd said there had been several days of rain prior to the fire, which created a false sense of security in the homeowner. However, the low hu-

midity, winds, and sunshine on Saturday had dried up most of the surface moisture conditions favorable for a wildfire. In addition, Floyd said the fire last Saturday was a classic example of what the Firewise program is intended to combat: particularly, the narrow roads, the lack of water, and burning without a permit.
