dings 706-896-7992.  $_{T(May4,G2)SH}$ ager. They want the property manager to screen the prospective tenant. They take the time to qualify the prospective tenant by verifying their income. They talk to the existing landlord and the previous landlord. They do a credit and a background check.

These owners and/or property managers need to know the laws relating to the property. Some of these laws that they need to know about are Megan's Law, Lead Base Paint, Fair Housing & Disability Act, just to mention a few.

It is imperative that there is a good lease in place that both parties understand. More importantly, the lease must be written to protect the landlord and also be fair to the tenant. The lease must abide by the laws of the state where the property is located. If there is no lease then neither party is protected.

Many landlords and tenants take the word of the other party and do not do a move in/ move out inspection. This one thing causes major problems if not done. The tenant takes possession of the property and before he/she moves in, you, the owner/property manager require that they do an as long as you pay attention to inspection and write down any DAMAGE. Then when they move out there is a written document in their handwriting

of what was damaged when

they took possession. Generally when this is done there are no arguments about what was damaged and what was not. Taking photos are also helpful but sometimes can not address something like "Are the windows clean or dirty?" It is amazing how many owners do not do this one thing that can make move outs go more smoothly.

Once a tenant has taken possession of the property and has signed a lease make sure that the tenants have given written proof that all utilities have been put in their name. If the utilities have not changed and are still in the owner's name, then the owner and/or property manager is NOT allowed to turn the utilities off.

Also, related to utilities, many water companies are now requiring owners to be responsible for water bills that have not been paid by the tenant. So when tenant moves out make sure they show written proof that the final water bill has been paid. If it has not, then you can charge them and use part of the security deposit as payment. Managing rental prop-
