

Mayor will recommend sewer service for Lowe's

Mayor Barbara Mathis will recommend that the city of Hiawassee grant the necessary sewer capacity to Lowe's before a June 1 deadline, the Mayor said this

Mayor Mathis said she will ask the Hiawassee City Council to approve the for Lowe's from the city's available reserves.

Mayor Mathis said her goal is to assure that the 75 permanent jobs and countless part-time jobs offered by Lowe's come to fruition in Towns County.

"I strongly believe that utilizing city reserves to bring jobs to Towns County is appropriate for the short term and for this project," Mathis

said. "Alternatives such as taking sewer from existing businesses or removing public facilities from existing sewer services are not permanent solutions."

Local officials have been working long hours trying to find a way to provide 1,100 gallons a day in sewer to Lowe's by June 1. That's the amount retail giant needs to operate its 96,000 square foot facility on 16 acres on Georgia 76 near The Junction. Lowe's has a June 1 deadline for finding enough sewer capacity to build its first store in Towns County.

A meeting of the necessary sewer allocation minds was held last week as the Towns County Industrial Development Authority, Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall and Hiawassee City Manager Rick Stancil got together to discuss ways to provide sewer services for the Lowe's Home Improvement Center project.
