The student with the highest GPA heading into the first week of the final month of the 2010-11 school year becomes Valedictorian, followed by the second highest, as Salutatorian. The student with the third highest GPA becomes the school's historian for the Class of 2011.

It was a fun-filled evening as the school recognized its underclassman for the first time.

"This is the first time that we've done this since I've been here and I think it's something that is long overdue for us to recognize all of our students," said Roy Perren, TCHS principal, as he addressed the crowd at TCHS, from behind the podium in the school's auditorium.

Six other students had reason to work harder as the three highest cumulative Grade Point Averages for the ninth and 10<sup>th</sup> grades were announced.

Leading the Ninth Grade GPAs, Brittany Ledford, followed by Ryan Talent, and Claire Wilson. The top 10<sup>th</sup> Grade GPA belonged to Jeannie Bradley, followed by Jessica Rogers, and Kristi McConnell.

"I want to make this a regular occurrence where we recognize not only our students who are graduating, but where we recognize all

of our other students as well," Perren told the crowd. "Thank you for your children; we're very proud of them."

Throughout the evening, students were recognized in their various areas of expertise, including agriculture, business and computer science. Other classes where students were recognized included health science, English, foreign language, math, physical education, science, and social studies. Each teacher had a chance to say a few nice words about the students receiving awards.

The most heartwarming moments of the departmental awards came when TCHS Chorus Director Chris Adams expressed his joy for having award recipient Lisa Boninghouse in his class.

"All I can say to Lisa is that I hope that she's enjoyed being in my class as much as I've enjoyed having her in it," Adams said.

Civics, U.S. History and World History educator Shannon Floyd expressed the joy he has received from teaching his U.S. History class this school year.

"I've had these students for three years and I'm really going to miss not teaching this class next year," Floyd said.

The awards for best scores on the Georgia High School Graduation Test followed. The first group, known as the "516 Club", "is quite a large group," said Perren.

"These are the students that passed all of their graduation test plus, in mathematics, they made a score of 516 or better. To pass the math portion of the graduation test, you have to make a score of 500 but the federal government actually recognizes 516 as a passing score," he said.

Next, honors for students who achieved the status of "Advanced Proficiency" on the graduation test. These students not only met graduation requirements, but excelled in the process.

The "A-B" Honor Roll and All "A" Honor Roll were announced for each grade. At the conclusion of that ceremony, Tiffany Hooper, was honored for the Perfect Attendance Award.

Perren closed the evening's ceremony, satisfied with the fact that all TCHS students, regardless of grade level, had been recognized for their academic excellence.

"There aren't enough words to express just how proud I am of these students," he said.
