Josh Turner will return to the Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds this Saturday at 7 p.m. to perform his hits.

Joshua Otis "Josh" Turner (born November 20, 1977) signed to MCA Nachville Records in 2003, Josh released his platinum certified debut album Long Black Train that year. This album produced a #13 in its title track.
