Coaches Award: Charles Corn, went above and beyond

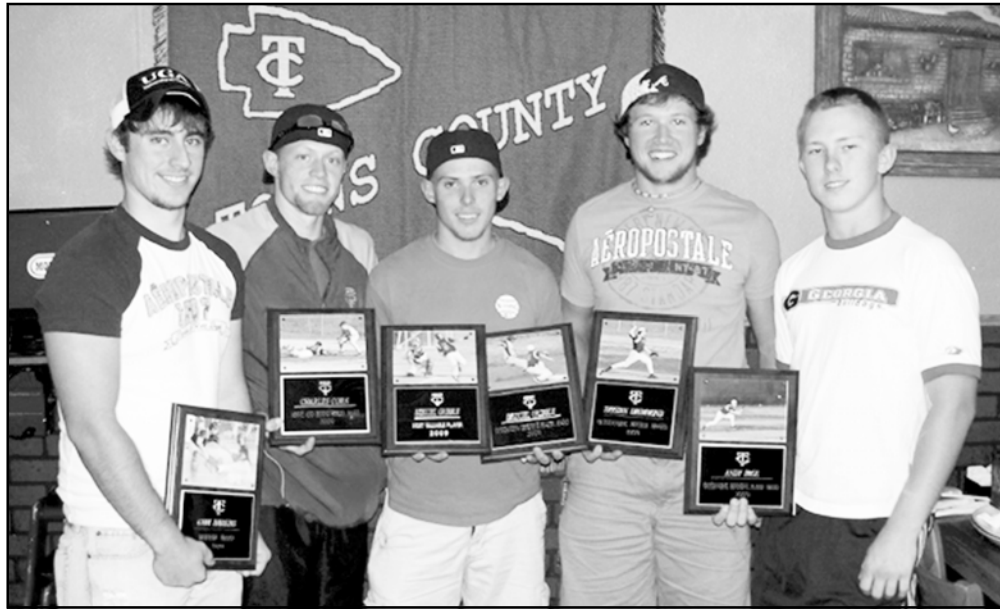
what was asked of the coaches.

Players receiving awards at the 2009 TCHS Baseball Banquet.

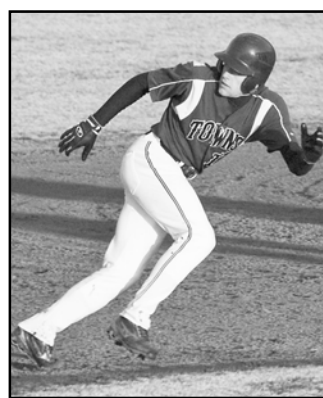

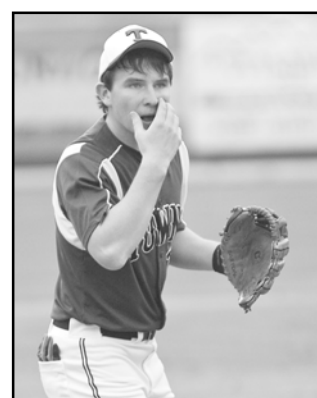

Murphy's racing school teacher wins \$3000 at Tri-County

Murphy High School champion basketball coach, David Payne, won his biggest race at his home town track in front of a huge cheering crowd. Payne followed Clinton, TN drive Anthony "Dirty White Boy" White, just inches apart for 38 laps until he made a bottom groove move under the high riding White in the second turn. White moved right back to Payne's bumper, but had to settle for the runner up spot.

While Payne and White battled, Brasstown's Ray Cook and Maryville, TN driver Tommy Kerr, the current Tennessee Thunder points leader, were in their own duel, just a few car length behind for third place with Cook taking that position.

The night started under clear skies with the track looking like it was ready for fast and exciting action. Just as the first set of cars were in line to enter the track, the first drops of rain hit the track. It rained for about 20 minutes and cars were called to enter the track and help dry it out to racing condition. Track promoter Steve Morris told the fans, "We will do every thing we can to get the track race worth if we can do it in time to meet our mid-night curfew."

With a two hour delay the first race hit the track for heats and qualifying. Murphy driver Jim Twiggs won the Modified Street feature in a caution free 15 lap event. Blairsville's Jacob Grizzle won the Nesmith Crate Late Model feature.

David Payne won the first fast six dash and Anthony White took the second dash which set the front row for the 40 lap Tarheel Shoot-Out. The race started with 23 of the 25 cars entered able to start. Various drivers at the tail of the field spun out causing seven cautions, once the drivers got that out of the way, racing was fast with battles all the way around the track. Kayne Hickman, Johnny Chastain, World of Outlaws national champion Steve Casebolt, Dan Tipton, Russell Thomas and Rodney Weeks rounded out the top 10.

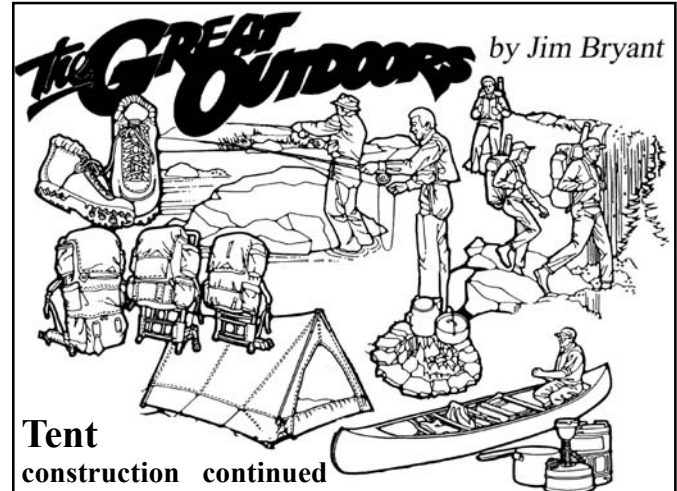
Due to the rain delay and the curfew, the Mini Stocks were unable to race, so they will run two features next Saturday night. The Street Stocks will also run their Mid-Season Championship.

The Lucas Oil Series ran at North Georgia Speedway Friday night and Joe Armes from east Tennessee was the winner, with Ray Cook running second. The series moves to Cleveland Speedway on Tuesday. A big crowd favorite, Clint Smith, won at Dixie Speedway Saturday night. David McCoy was the winner at Toccoa Speedway. Young Harris driver Randy Nichols took third place in the main event. Racing return to Sugar Creek Raceway in Blue Ridge this Friday. Go karts also return to Tri-County Friday night.

Tent construction continued

Tent floors should be made of the same type of tough, waterproof material used in the first six-eight inches of the tent wall, nearest the floor. This configuration forms a sort of plastic "bathtub" shape in the bottom of the tent. This bathtub configuration seals out water from entering the tent. It should also be noted that if water gets into the tent, this bathtub bottom also holds in the water! Seams on the floor should be "sealed" with lengths of waterproof tape or liquid seam sealer. Some tents come unsealed so check the directions to see if you have to apply seam sealer yourself.

Tents should be constructed with bound and lap-felled seams. BOUND-SEAMS are crafted by stitching through a layer of material (non-waterproof taffeta) folded over two other pieces being joined. The bound seam method is the weaker of the two types of seams. LAP-SEAMEDS are created by placing the two pieces of the fabrics being joined over one another, then folding and stitching them together. Better quality tents are made using as many lap-felled seams as possible, and have bound seams when more than two pieces of material are joined. Generally, lighter, better constructed tents employ lap-felled seams which are flatter than bound seams.

RAINFLIES are not insects but covers attached to a tent some 2-4 inches above the breathable tent fabric. The space created prevents outside moisture from entering the tent while allowing inside air and moisture to escape. Rainflies have to be seam-sealed every few seasons.

Water tends to leak through needle holes in the tent's stitching; therefore most tents come with a small bottle of sealant designed to close these tiny holes. Spread the fly and tent if not seam-taped, on a flat surface and apply the sealant along the seams. Allow to dry according to instructions, then apply a second coat.

Tents are designed for use in specific seasons. THREE-SEASON tents are designed for use in spring, summer and fall. FOUR-SEASON tents are designed for the worst of weather conditions, but ventilation will not be good in warm weather. Such heavier tents have more poles and extra waterproofing to withstand blistering winds and raging rain storms and snow storms. These tents are quite a bit more expensive and are not recommended for the weekend camper, unless you plan to camp in snowy conditions.

VENTILATION is an important factor for the average weekend camper. The amount and location of ventilation is important, especially in warm climates. Windows, doors dome panels and their locations will give the camper "breathing" space in the tent. Keep in mind that windows located too high on the tent sides will offer much less circulation for a sleeper lying on the tent floor well below the windows. Dome panels work well to quickly remove hot air and moisture out of the tent in arid climates, but are a poor choice in cold climates.
