white-checkered finish was set with one lap to go when Sam Hornish, lost control of his Dodge and clipped Kurt Busch, damaging both cars. Harvick's teammate,

Clint Bowyer, was leading on the restart but got tangled up down the backstretch and spun out of contention. It was a tough break for Bowyer, who appeared to be heading for his first Daytona victory. 'It was every man for himself at that point," contin-

ued Harvick. "You know the guys behind you are going to push you as hard as they can. So if I'd slowed down to let him in or something like that, it would have just given the other line more momentum. At that point you just hope your line goes faster than the other

'Tonight we were in the right line, on the bottom, and it wound up working out.'

Kasey Kahne finished second and Jeff Gordon. Dale Earnhardt, Jr., was fourth after running poorly most of the night. Jeff Burton was fifth after being involved in a multicar crash that red-flagged the race for nearly 20 minutes.

More than 20 cars were involved in this accident, which had debris scattered for more than half-a-mile on the track. In fact, many of the frontrunners in the race were eliminated, including Juan Montoya, Tony Stewart, Jimmie Johnson, Brad Keselowski, Ryan Newman and others.

Carl Edwards finished champion and winner of 84 sixth, followed by Kurt Busch, whose Dodge looked like a candidate for the junkyard. Rounding out the top-


