With Towns County just a few days removed from celebrating the Fourth of July, Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall has fielded numerous inquiries about the county's noise ordinance regarding fireworks.

Commissioner Kendall is quick to point out that there is no such ordinance in Towns County.

The biggest question involving a noise ordinance is making an ordinance that would restrict the use of fireworks on private property.

"I have had anonymous complaints about noise from fireworks on private property and requests to put in a noise ordinance to prohibit these fireworks," Commissioner Kendall said. The commissioner said he had no interest in imposing fireworks restrictions on Towns County residents. He cited the fact that July 4th should hold a special mean-
