playing a George Strait-brand of Country Music.

Thurmond, accompanied by his father Roger Thurmond and his brother Tim Thurmond, said that his father started the band when he and his brother were just young boys.

"We've been playing together for a long time," Tom Thurmond said. "Ever since my brother and I were about 8 years old. It's been a heck of a lot of fun over the years."

On Friday, Little Miss Dynamite, Brenda Lee, also a Georgia native, sounded out the hits that made her a star in both the Pop and Country Music genres. She's the only Georgian in both the Rock 'N Roll and Country Music Hall of Fames.

"I can't tell you how special it is to be here in Hiawassee, Georgia," said Lee, an Atlanta native. "I've performed in 86 different countries and all over the United States. But there's nothing like performing in front of the home folks."

Another Georgian kicked off the day for Lee. Freddie Way, one of the rising stars of Country Music and a native of Cornelia, told the crowd that it was an honor opening for Brenda Lee.

"She's a legend," he said. "It's an honor to share the same stage with her."

On Saturday, The Brothers Bellamy took the stage.

One thing is for certain, one of the most successful duos in Pop and Country Music brought a

capacity crowd to its feet after playing the bulk of its 14 No. 1 hits. Those songs included *If I Said You Had a Beautiful Body (Would You Hold It Against Me)*, *Sugar Daddy*, *Redneck Girl*, *Dancing Cowboys*, *For All the Wrong Reasons*, *Old Hippie*, *Reggae Cowboy*, and *Kids of the Baby Boom*.

The Brothers or what's left of them as Howard Bellamy jokingly said, love to bring their Grammy-nominated act to the stage. They love Georgia and they especially love the folks who come to Hiawassee.

"Y'all are a diehard bunch of fans," David Bellamy quipped to the crowd. "Thank you all for being here."

The Brothers engaged the crowd urging fans to sing along as they belted out their legendary list of songs. The duo received a warm welcome from those in attendance. In the 1990s, Billboard named the Bellamy Brothers as Top Country

Duo; in addition, the brothers eventually went on to set the record for most duo nominations from both the Academy of Country Music and the Country Music Association, despite having never won either duo award.

Union County native Tommy Townsend, now of Nashville, Tenn., opened for The Bellamy Brothers.

He concentrated on his local ties to the North Georgia Mountains. He wasn't shy about telling that he was born in Towns County, but raised in Blairsville.

"How many of you here tonight are locals?" Townsend asked the crowd.

A loud cheer echoed throughout Anderson Music Hall.

"I'm proud to be here to perform for you tonight," he said.

On Monday evening, the legendary Ray Price wooed the capacity crowd with his collection of all-time favorites that included *For The Good Times*, *Danny Boy* and *Release Me*.

for the Democratic nod for Secretary of State. Buckner lost in her bid four years ago to become Secretary of State to Karen Handel, who did not complete her full term as Secretary of State, rather opting to run for governor. Buckner took 35 percent of the vote in the Democratic Primary to 22.6 percent for Sinkfield.

The July 20 primary did settle two local races: Enotah Judicial Circuit Dis-

trict Attorney and State Senate District 50. Jeff Langley will be the circuit's new District Attorney as he defeated Raymond George in three of the four counties that make up the circuit, including Towns County.

State Sen. Jim Butterworth returns to the Gold Dome after soundly defeating his challenger Terry Rogers in six of the eight counties that make up the 50th Senate District, including Towns County.
