Pain at The Pump continues

Northeast Georgia gas prices well above the norm as oil prices tumble

Oil prices continue to plunge as investors shift gears from the commodity, to gold and U.S. Treasury Bonds following the recent selloff on Wall Street.

Gold skyrocketed to more than \$1,754 an ounce on Tuesday while oil opened Tuesday morning at \$78 a barrel, the cheapest it's been in almost a year.

However, the price at the gas pumps, especially in Northeast Georgia, continues to stay well above prices at convenience stores south of Atlanta.

Locally and throughout most of Northeast Georgia, a gallon of gasoline is costly.

In Towns County on Tuesday morning, the cheanest gallon of gas was at Cash Gas, off Georgia 76 near the Friendship CommuDIESEL
