The Cherokee Braves crossed the Georgia-North Carolina border and invaded Frank McClure Stadium to do gridiron battle with the Towns County Indians on Friday night.

The Indians won the opening coin toss and took advantage early.

Running back Noah Calhoun took a sweep right 66 yards on the first play from scrimmage for the opening score giving the Indians a six point lead just 19 seconds into the game.

Down 6-0 early on, the Braves led by Senior QB Jesse Blanton and a strong running game by sophomore tailback Dorian Walkingstick started their opening series from their own 30-yard line.

The Indians' defense looked strong early on as linebacker Wesley Bloodworth sacked Blanton for a loss. The Indians appeared to have the Braves opening drive stopped on fourth and short from the Indians' 25-yard line but the measurement by the chain gang didn't go their way. The fresh set of downs gave the Braves' drive new life. One play into the fresh set of downs, Walkingstick took the football into the end zone tying the score at 6-6.

After a couple of stalled offensive drives resulting in punts for each team, Blanton created problems on the other side of the ball, picking off a pass by Indians' freshman quarterback Jackson Noblet late in the first quarter. The Braves drove to the Towns 1-yard-line as the first quarter expired.

Five seconds into the

second quarter, Blanton took the ball into the end zone on a quarterback sneak and gave Cherokee a 12-6 lead.

With the Indians suddenly unable to move the ball, the Braves offense maintained momentum. Cherokee took control of the clock for most of the second quarter. Blanton once again carried the ball into the end zone giving the Braves an 18-6 advantage with 2:51 remaining in the half. The two teams went to the locker room with the Braves holding a 12-point advantage.

As the teams emerged from the half, the Braves' offense took over on their own 20-yard-line after a deep Indians kickoff by Calhoun.

Following stalled drives from both offenses, Blanton took off for a 56-yard touchdown run putting the Braves up 24-6. A successful two-point conversion put Cherokee up

On an important potential game changing drive, the Indians were unable to convert a fourth and 3 situation and left the Indians searching for answers on offense.

The Braves with a 20-point advantage continued their offensive momentum on a 27-yard reverse play for a touchdown by sophomore running back Seth Littlejohn. That pushed the envelope and made the score 33-6 Cherokee with 1:54 left in the third quarter.

The Braves maintained ground and clock control throughout the remainder of the game. They widened the scoring margin further on an 8-yard scamper by Walkingstick, giving Cherokee a 39-6 lead with 11:37 remaining.

Noblet finished off the drive with a 14-yard touchdown run with 7:21 left making it a 39-13 game and giving the Indians an ounce of hope.

Late in the fourth, Noblet once again found the end zone on a 15-yard touchdown run with 1:31 left in the game closing the gap to 39-20 Cherokee.

The Indians' hopes of a comeback were dashed after an onside kick by Calhoun effort against Cherokee. was recovered by the Braves.

"We've still got room to improve. We missed some tackles here and there," he said. "We're going to try and get better each week.




