Did you know that many people feel that if you make good money that you would be a good tenant. This is not necessarily true. Good tenants are people who pay the rent, pay on time, take care of the property and let the landlord/property manager know of repairs that are required. Just because they make good money does not mean they are responsible.

Once you receive an application from a prospective tenant it is imperative that all information is verified. Many landlords do not call the previous landlord. This is a major mistake on their part. Here are some questions to ask the previous landlord.

Did they leave the property in good condition? Did they pay their rent on time? Did they have any late payments? Did they have a lease and if so, did they fulfill the lease? Did they receive their security deposit back?

After you have gotten good responses on all of the questions above, there is one more very important question to ask the previous landlord.

Are you related to the applicant? If they hesitate at all then you know that they probably are related. Everything they just told you is probably not true.

If they said the applicant paid on time, no late fees etc, there is no guarantee that they even paid the rent. Just recently, I had a situation where the applicant had a

good report from the previous

landlord. The applicant had great

income but had a horrible credit

score. Something just was not adding up. There was a snake in the wood pile. The previous address was on a very short street in Towns County. I called an acquaintance, who lived on the street and asked her if she knew the applicant. She said, "Yes."

Something told me to go to the tax records and see who owned this house. It was not on the tax records. I then drove by the house. When I did, I realized that the acquaintance's husband owned the house. She was the

applicant's stepmother.

Here was the outcome. The acquaintance lied. Previous landlord lied. Applicant falsified their application. When I called the applicant and confronted her on this, she said, "I don't know what the problem is. I really lived in Hayesville not Hiawassee. I just wrote down the wrong ad-
