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Victory is sweet as Indians claim first win of 2010

The suddenly well traveled Towns County Indians took their road show to historic Kennesaw on Friday to face the 2-3 Eagles of North Cobb Christian. They returned home grinning from ear-to-ear.

A 48-18 win does wonders for your confidence.

The Indians claimed the first win of the 2010 season in exciting fashion, coming from behind, then scoring often and unmercifully, upending the Eagles on their home turf.

Without benefit of football lights at the Eagles stadium, the unusual daytime kickoff took on the feel of a collegiate-type atmosphere. However, things were uncertain early on for the Indians and all the game momentum was seemingly swinging the Eagles' way.

The Indians took the opening kickoff and appeared to want to run early and often. Their first drive was met with a quick Eagles defensive stand, forcing a Towns County three-






