Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall was visibly upset at the news.

"The state is going to have to live up to its obligations and quit dumping those responsibilities on local governments," Kendall said. "There's already talk of more cutbacks at the health department and at the library because the state is cutting its budget. Those services have been placed on the shoulders of local governments."

The region's chief ranger, Tony Harkins, deferred comments about the closure of the Towns County forestry facility to Forestry Commission Manager Ken Masten in Gainesville. Masten was unavailable for comment on Monday due to the state holiday celebrating Columbus Day.

Towns County Fire Chief Mitch Floyd said that Ranger Harkins recently informed him of the news to close the Towns facility. Floyd said the county will have to keep its fingers crossed for a wet winter as the time for potential wildfires have arrived.
