Willie returns to Hiawassee

The *Red-Headed Stranger* is headed back to Hiawassee.

Willie Nelson, actor, activist, singer, songwriter and the penman behind Patsy Cline's smash hit, "Crazy," has agreed to come back to Anderson Music Hall to perform on Feb. 11, said Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds General Manager Hilda Thomason.

"On Saturday, Feb. 11th, Willie Nelson will again be in concert at Anderson Music Hall," Thomason told the Towns County Herald last week.

"Willie Nelson, the *Red-Headed Stranger* is coming back to town; it's really an exciting time at the Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds," she said. "That's a big announcement for us

to have something going on in the winter months when tourism is slow, hotels are slow and restaurants are slow. It's a great opportunity again to promote tourism in Towns County."

Tickets go on sale Dec. 2 at the Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds Box Office, Thomason said.

Tickets are \$45 plus a \$2 handling charge, Thomason said.

"Willie tickets sold out in six days in 2009," Thomason said. "I think we will have a good turnout for this event again and we want

folks to be ready to make plans to see Willie Nelson."

Thomason also made an announcement regarding a Willie Nelson Feb. 11th appearance at the Bad Company/Molly Hatchet show on Saturday.

Willie might not be the only big name coming to Hiawassee in February.

"We have an offer out to Trace Adkins for Feb. 24th," Thomason said. "That's not confirmed yet, but hopefully we'll get those details worked out. We'll know something soon on that."

The Fairgrounds also has an offer out on *The Happy Together Tour*, featuring The Turtles, The Monkeys, The Buckingham, The Grass Roots and Gary Puckett and The Union Gap.

"It'll be a great, great concert," Thomason said.

Kendall begins Budget approval process Thursday

Commissioner keeps county budget at \$9.38 million

Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall is poised to begin the process of approving a proposed \$9.38 million County Budget for Fiscal 2012 on Thursday at the Towns County Courthouse.

Commissioner Kendall said last week that he will cut the county's millage rate from 5.570 mills to 5.320 mills as part of the Budget approval process.

A public hearing is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Thursday at the Towns County Courthouse to begin the millage rate approval process prior to the adoption of the 2012 County Budget.

The millage rate decrease keeps the 2012 Bud-

get almost identical to the 2011 Budget. One major difference is a 30 cent per hour raise across the board for county employees (elected officials excluded).

Commissioner Kendall said the county will continue to keep a tight lid on spending as the local economy continues to recover from the worst economic times since 1933.

The good news: sales tax revenues have rebounded in 2011, bringing in \$60,000 more than a year ago.

They paid tribute to America's Armed Forces, Prisoners of War and those Missing in Action, the Late, Great Danny Joe Brown and the members of Lynyrd Skynyrd that perished in a plane crash in 1977.

The tribute was the Southern Rock Anthem *Freebird* and the message was "never forget; always remember."

Molly Hatchet, the opening act for Brian Howe's version of Bad Company on Saturday at Anderson Music Hall stole the show as Jacksonville, Fla.'s finest did what they do best, play to the crowd.

Lead vocals Phil McCormick kept the crowd engaged and on the edge of their seats as the hard-rocking, heavy metal band that debuted in the late 1970s played its heart out.

It was a charged crowd that bounced, and did the shake, rattle and roll in
