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Indians rally thwarted; lose to Glascock 34-19

The Towns County Indians gave it their best shot in the second half, but couldn't pull off a repeat of their stunning 2010 come-from-behind victory over Glascock County.

The Indians managed to pull off the shocker last season with a 47-45 overtime win.

Friday night in Gibson, the Indians trailed 22-6 at the half. They rallied for two second half scores, but ended up on the short end of a 34-19 final. "The effort was okay,"

Indians Head Football Coach Kyle Langford said. "We had a couple mistakes that really hurt us but give the kids credit, they continued to play hard for all four quarters. Early mistakes put the

Indians in trouble early, accounting for two quick scores for Glascock, and a 14-0 lead 5 minutes of the game.

"The rest of the game was very entertaining football, Coach Langford said. "The first five minutes got us. We kept fighting and I felt like we improved in some areas. Some areas we've still got a ways to go, but we'll show up and play hard these last two weeks.

Glascock gave the Indians a chance to get back in the game, but the Indians couldn't capitalize on the favors.

"There's no disgrace in losing, but there is disgrace in not continuing the fight or coming back," Coach Langford said. "In the end we're here to build character. It's not the way we want to do it, but it's the way were going to have to."

The Indians are back at Frank McClure Stadium on Friday for the final home game of the 2012 season.

League playoffs. They did so in comefrom-behind fashion, claiming a 27-20 victory over the Jefferson Dragons at Panther Field in Jackson County.

The Mighty Mites fought back from an 8-point halftime deficit, driving a dagger through the heart of the Dragons late to claim the come-from-behind playoff victory.

Behind a rock solid offensive line, Hayden McClure rushed for 160 yards and four touchdowns accounting for all of the Tiny Mite conventional

Down 14-6 at the half the Tiny Mites searched for and found their answers when McClure broke loose early in the third quarter for his second score of the day, racing in from 22 yards out to pull the Mites within one point of the Dragons

14-13. Dragon running back Malaki Starks broke loose on the next play from scrimmage for a 65-yard touchdown giving

the Dragons a 20-13 edge. As the third quarter clock wound down, the Mites tied the score 20-20 on a McClure quarterback keeper.

Both defenses held strong throughout the fourth quarter until the Mites defense stepped up and stopped the Dragons offense cold, forcing a late turnover on downs and halting a Dragon drive at the Mites' 40-yard-line.

From there McClure and Ivester ran roughshod behind the Mighty Mites' Iron Curtain offensive line. McClure capped the drive with under a minute remaining with another quarterback keeper, this time from 9-yards out, giving the Mites a decisive come-from-behind 27-20 lead.

The Dragons received the ball again but couldn't penetrate the Great Wall of Mites' defense preserving the road playoff win for Towns County.

Towns County Youth Football Coordinator Jimmy Smith along with Head Coach Rodney Thomas and staff expressed their pride in the Tiny Mites and would like to encourage community support as they look to avenge an earlier season loss to the undefeated Wildcats
