Keeping taxes low is the key to economic stimulus, State Sen. Jim Butterworth said.

Towns County, which has one of the lowest tax millage rates in the state, and Georgia's other 158 counties are poised for an economic turn-around using free market principles, said Sen. Butterworth, who repreate District 50.

hear a variety of suggestions on how to turn around the economy.

"These suggestions can be as reasonable as tax incentives for job growth or as outlandish as raising taxes on struggling businesses and families," Sen. Butterworth said. "Raising taxes in Georgia is not an option. Georgia is poised for an economic turn-around utilizing free-
