The Towns County Indians had three players in double digits en route to a come from behind 59-42 preseason win over the Blue Ridge, NC Bob-

The Indians held small leads for most of the first quarter but found themselves at a 7-7 standoff by quarter's end. They then jumped out to a 12-7 advantage during the first minute of play of the second quarter but Blue Ridge struck for 8 straight points and a 15-12 lead with 4:28 on the clock.

The Indians used the 3-point shot to advantage the remainder of the quarter, however, as sophomore Aaron Dodson's second trey of the stanza got them a 15-15 tie at 4:08 and freshman Grant Arencibia sank three treys between the 3:11 and forty nine second marks. Arencibia's shots gave the Indians an 18-17 lead, a 21-21 tie, and a 24-21 lead which became the score at intermission.

A trey and a deuce had Blue Ridge leading 26-24 a minute and a half into the third quarter but the Indians exploded for a 20-1 run between the 6:18 and 1:45 marks for a 44-27 lead which the Bobcats reduced slightly to 44-30 entering the fourth quarter. A Brandon Henderson basket got the Indians even at 26-26 and another by junior Ryan Tallent at 5:30 gave them a 28-26 lead they would never relinquish. Tallent included a pair of treys in leading the third quarter onslaught with 10

The Indians took a pair of twenty one point fourth quarter leads at 53-32 and 55-34 before closing out the 59-42 win. Arencibia struck for two additional treys in leading the fourth quarter action, finishing the game with five for eight accuracy from behind the 3-point line.

Scoring leaders for the game were Arencibia with 15 points, Tallent with 12, Dodson with 10, freshman Dallas Manus with 7, and Rylan Albach and Henderson with 6 each. Seven different Indians contributed at least one assist with leaders being Albach with 4, Dakota Barrett and Manus with 3 each. and sophomore Brett Barrett and Tallent with 2 each according to your reporter's unofficial tally. Other Indians seeing action but not mentioned earlier were junior Austin Wood and sophomores Garrett Bradshaw and Stetson Hedden.



tcherald@windstream.net Young Harris - Corey Garrett won't be eligible to suit up for the Young Harris College Mountain Lions until the Christmas Break, but the Blairsville native said he's looking forward to hitting the hardwood.

"This is my first year playing college ball," said Garrett, who starred for the Union County Panthers during his prep days. "I'm really excited; it's going to be a different experience just going from high school ball to a college atmosphere. It should be real fun m excited.

Garrett was dressed in street clothes as the Mountain Lions triumphed 76-61 in their season opener at the Valley of Doom on Saturday against Bryan College.

"We play hard for Coach (Pete) Herrmann," Garrett said. "Offensively we've looked pretty good, if we just play defense the way were coached to play defense, we should come out on top. Garrett expects

Mountain Lions to be a versatile squad this season with several players experienced at the various positions on the hard-

The top three scorers sophomore guards Frank Adams and Steven Viterbo, and sophomore forward Bryson Robertson – return from last season. Adams led the team with 21.7 points per contest and was third in rebounding at 6.2 boards off the glass.

Viterbo, who can play four different positions, led the Mountain Lions with 8.2 rebounds a game and 63 steals; he was second in scoring at 16.9 points per game. Robertson led Young Harris in blocked shots with 53, was second in rebounding with 7.4 boards per game and third in scoring, averaging 11.5 points per game.

"Steve (Viterbo) was our MVP last season," Mountain Lions' Head Coach Pete Herrmann said. "Frank (Adams) is a great driver and penetra-tor while Bryson (Robertson) was our most athletic player up

Robertson scored 25 points against Bryan to lead the Mountain Lions to a 76-61 vic-

Mountain Lions' sophomore guard Vince Martin, who was redshirted last season, also is expected to make an immediate impact for the Mountain Lions. He scored 16 points in the Mountain Lions' Homecoming

Garrett is expected to miss a total of 10 games before he becomes eligible to suit up for the Mountain Lions.

He says playing under Coach Herrmann is an exciting and educational experience. "He knows all there is to

know about basketball," Garrett said. "It's a huge learning experience. I love him to death. He's awesome, I'm thankful I have this opportunity to learn from (one of) the best."
