It seems they had planned the building of the new infrastructure before the decline in the economy occurred, when the housing market fell apart, construction ground to a halt, foreclosures were everywhere, businesses closed their doors and of course Blue Ridge meters declined dramatically but instead of putting things on hold they decided to go ahead anyway and put the load on their members even though most are struggling and cannot afford it. I don't know about anyone else but my bill has doubled even though Blue Ridge claimed the increase would only be around \$1.49 a customer. Until 2008 the customer charge was a hidden charge until Rural Electrification made them declare it. They even state in their explanation that the customers left have to foot the bill and I quote "Our growth advantage has been removed and yet we still have to pay for the new infrastructure - in addition to the customer service charge increase we will also increase the KWH charge". They do not explain the new meters which was another expenditure that was unnecessary. They can sit in their easy chair and read these meters yet they claim they have to cover the cost of reading the meter, billing the customer and collecting payments even though if you don't send the payment they charge \$20 to come out and collect. They go on to say they have cut costs by retiring 14 employees. These people receive large retirement pensions so where is the saving? Blue Ridge is a large company abusing their power with the conviction they are untouchable.


