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Indians overwhelmed by Hayesville and Rabun, show improvement in loss to Union

The Towns County Indians Varsity Basketball Team came out on the short end in all three games against longtime "neighborhood" rivals last week as they traveled to Hayesville on Tuesday before returning home to face two Class AA rivals, Rabun County and Union County on Friday and Saturday. The three losses leave them with a 1-5 record entering Region 8-A play this INDIANS AT HAYESVILLE

The home Hayesville Yellow Jackets returned most of their fire power from last year and quickly took control of the game on Tuesday, building a 15-1 lead just past the mid-point of the first quarter and holding a 25-6 lead by quarter's end. They extended the lead to 43-13 by halftime despite five second quarter points and eight for the half by freshman Dallas Manus. The Jackets continued

their dominance for as much as a 62-13 lead before the Indians closed the gap the final two and a half minutes of the third quarter and throughout the fourth. A late third quarter trev by Ryan Tallent set the score at 66-18 and the junior added a second trey and a deuce early in the fourth quarter as the Indians outscored the Jackets 10-6 in the final stanza for a 72-28

Manus led the Indians in scoring for the game with 11 points with Tallent close behind with 8 while Rylan Albach led in assists with 3.

INDIANS VERSUS RABUN

The Class AA sixthranked Rabun County Wildcats took a resounding victory over the Indians on opening night in Tiger last month and quickly threatened to continue their dominance over the Indians on Friday in the TCHS Gym. They sprang out to a 15-3 first quarter lead which they extended to 21-4 barely three minutes into the second before the Indians used a modest 8-5 run to within 26-12 but trailed 28-12 at inter-

The Wildcats returned to dominance in the third quarter as they took a 53-16 lead to the fourth quarter. The Indians closed out the fourth quarter on a positive note as guards Grant Arencibia and Dallas Manus each included a 3-point basket within five point production as they reduced the final margin to

Scoring leaders for the game were Arencibia with 9 points and Manus with 5 as Rylan Albach again led in assists with

INDIANS VERSUS UNION

The Union County Panthers, like the Indians, suffered heavy losses to graduation but entered the game against the Indians with a 2-2 record, including a split of two games with Class AAA White County, a win over Class AA Jackson County, and a loss to Class AAAA Forsyth Central. They did get a break with the arrival this year of junior guard Rhett McCombs, a Union County native, who had been attending private school in Fannin

McCombs and returning starting junior guard Zach Odom would prove to be the difference as they poured in 31 and 22 points respectively in leading the Panthers to a quite competitive 63-49 victory over the Indians on Saturday night. The Panthers sank a 3-point basket less than a minute into the game and would never trail but the Indians overcame significant first half deficits in staying in striking distance until the closing minutes of the

The Panthers finished the first quarter with a 17-9 lead and opened up a bulging 29-11 lead just past the five minute mark of the second quarter before the Indians made their first impressive run of the game. They embarked on a 14-3 run between the 4:35 and 1:18 marks of the second quarter, beginning with an old fashioned three point play by senior Brandon Henderson and ending with freshman Grant Arencibia's second 3-point basket of the run with freshman Dallas Manus including four of his seven second quarter points. The run had the Indians suddenly knocking on the door in trailing by just a

Panthers pushed out to a 48-32 lead before a 9-3 run the final three minutes of the third quarter had the Indians back to within 51-41 entering the fourth quarter.

Henderson included. The Panthers scored the first four points of the fourth quarter for a 55-41 lead before the Indians made one last 6-1 run on field goals by Ryan Tallent, Dakota Barrett, and Manus for a single digits deficit of 56-47 with 4:51 still on the clock and they had several opportunities to get closer than that lulah Falls on Tuesday of this but couldn't connect with the basket. A three point play by Union was nearly matched by two free throws by Arencibia for a 59-49 score with 2:58 still remaining but that would turn out to be the final points for the

The Panthers responded with a field goal at 2:33 and, after the Indians missed two free throws at 2:25, successfully

played keep away for most of the remaining time on the clock and sank a field goal with three seconds left for a final margin of victory of 63-49.

Leading scorers in the game for the Indians were Manus with 13 points, Henderson with 12, Barrett with 9, Arencibia with 8, and Tallent with 5. Seven different Indians each contributed one assist according to your reporter's unofficial tally.

After traveling to Talweek, upcoming games for the Indians include home court contests this weekend against Lakeview Academy on Friday and Dawson County on Saturday. They then close out the 2011 portion of the regular season next week with road trips to Gainesville to take on Riverside Military Academy on Tuesday, Dec. 13, and to Union County on Friday, Dec. 16.

Indian JV's lose three games but continue to show promise for the future

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A difficult season continued last week for the Towns County Indian Junior Varsity as far as putting a victory on the scoreboard, but individual players continued to show progress, which should become evident in the win column in the future. The Indians lost three games for the week, at Hayesville on Tuesday and at home to Class AA rivals Rabun County on Friday and Union County on Saturday.

The Indians trailed by just an 8-6 score after one quarter with Brett Barrett contributing four points on Tuesday only to see the Yellow Jackets strike for seventeen second quarter points interrupted only by a Grant Arencibia trey as Hayesville led 25-9 at intermission.

In his only quarter of the game, Dallas Manus included three for four free throw shooting in a five point third quarter as the Yellow Jackets outscored the Indians by just a 14-10 margin in that quarter. The fourth quarter saw the Jackets extend their lead for a final score of 56-28 with Boone Moss contributing four points in the quarter for the In-Arencibia and Boone

Moss led the Indians in scoring for the game with 6 points each while Barrett and Manus were right behind with 5 each and Cruz Shook led in assists with

It was a tough night from start to finish for the Indians on Friday against Rabun County as the Wildcats blistered the nets in leading 31-6, 52-8, and 75-16 at the quarter breaks in taking a 78-23 victory. Leading the Indians in scoring for the game were Dallas Manus and Boone Moss with 4 points each as four different Indians receive credit for one

With several Indians doing double duty and seeing either one or two quarters of action with the JV's there were a number of encouraging individual performances against Union County in a quite competitive overall contest. Earnhardt named favorite driver again

lar Driver for the ninth straight year. Earnhardt Jr. earned the award after receiving the most online fan votes among all eligible Cup drivers throughout the 2011 racing season.

Fans cast nearly 1.5 million total votes throughout the 2011 campaign. The nine other finalists were (in alphabetical order): Kyle Busch, Carl Edwards, Jeff Gordon, Kevin Harvick, Jimmie Johnson, Kasey Kahne, Matt Kenseth, Bobby Labonte and Tony Stewart.

Earnhardt finished seventh in the points standings, his best finish in six seasons. But, he did not surpass the numbers amassed during his first season at Hendrick Motorsports. In 2008, the No. 88 team won at Michigan, scored 10 top-fives, 16 top-10s and led 896 laps.

This year, Earnhardt earned four top-fives and 12 top-10s. But the most glaring statistic is the number of laps Earnhardt led: 52. That's the fewest number of laps he's led since he began racing the Cup full time in 2000.

"We would definitely liked to have won a race, and opportunities to do that are running low," Earnhardt said. 'As far as the points go, I think we made a decent account of ourselves, but I do feel like, and I think our team understands that we're better than even where we are now in the points standings. We feel con-
