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Indians victimized by stalling tactics and Lady Indians fall to early

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The Towns County Indians Varsity Basketball Team was on the road for games against Region 8A opponent Riverside Military Academy in Gainesville on Tuesday and Class AA Union County on Friday of last week. Stalling tactics by Riverside and Indian turnovers at Union left them short of victory in otherwise winnable games as the Indians saw their overall record fall to 2-9 and their Region 8A record drop to 1-2.

INDIANS AT RIVER-SIDE MILITARY – The Indians took three early leads of 2-0, 5-2, and 7-5 at Riverside with the first two leads being compliments of a deuce and a trey by Dakota Barrett and the third on a drive for two by Dallas Manus but the Eagles got ahead 9-7 by the five minute mark and held a 15-14 lead at quarter's end. Barrett and Manus divided the individual scoring with each including a trey among seven points in the quarter.

Manus took the ball coast to coast after a steal for a 16-15 Towns lead just fifteen seconds into the second quarter and, with the exception of brief 16-16 and 20-20 standoffs, the Indians held leads of as much as four points on two occasions until late in the quarter. A free throw by Stetson Hedden and a trey by Grant Arencibia broke the two ties while Ryan Tallent scored five points on a trey and two free throws in the quarter. Two late Indian turnovers allowed the Eagles to finish on a 5-0 run for a 27-26 lead at intermission.

There were two ties and three lead changes in the third quarter with no more than a three point lead for either team and the Indians leading 42-39 at quarter's end. Ryan Tallent scored eight points in the quarter, giving the Indians a 31-29 lead on a three point play, a 33-33 tie on a deuce, and a 38-37 lead on a trey by the 2:08 mark with a pair of Brandon Henderson baskets keeping them ahead for a 43-39 lead entering the fourth quarter.

The Eagles opened the fourth quarter with a 7-0 run for a 46-42 lead, however, with a Tallent basket on a nice baseline drive at 5:28 cutting the lead to 46-44. Those would turn out to be the final points for the Indians in the game, however, as the Eagles matched Tallent's basket with one of their own fourteen seconds later for a 48-44 lead and they called time out

The Indians would have just three possessions of the ball the remainder of the game as the Eagles went into a stall following the time out and held possession of the ball until they turned it over on a double dribble violation with 1:43 on the clock, giving the Indians their first possession since the time out. After the Indians missed an ensuing field goal attempt, they had just four team fouls so made their fifth and sixth at the forty seven and forty two sec-

to the foul line for a one and one opportunity on the seventh foul of the half at 32.4 seconds.

The Eagles sank two charity tosses for a 50-44 lead and the Indians turned the ball over after gaining possession with the Eagles sinking another free throw at 13.7 seconds for a 51-44 lead which held up for the win when a late Indian field goal attempt missed the mark.

The Indians were led in scoring for the game by Tallent with 15 points, Manus with 11, Dakota Barrett with 7, and Arencibia with 5. Leading in assists were Rylan Albach with building a 54-38 lead by the 5 and Manus with 3.

After falling behind and free trailing from beginning to end against Union County on their home court fourteen days earlier in a 63-49 loss, the Indians exerted a stiff challenge for some two and a half quarters on the Panthers' home court. The Indians managed three early ties and an 8-6 lead on back to back baskets by Rylan Albach by the 3:46 mark.

The Panthers used three treys to advantage after that, regaining and increasing the lead, with a threat of taking control of the game with a 22-15 lead by quarter's end. Most of the sec-

onds marks, sending the Eagles ond quarter actually belonged to the Indians, however, as they outscored the Panthers 11-1 during the first six minutes for a 26-23 lead but the Panthers turned three Indians turnovers into six points the last 1:13 of the quarter for a 29-26 lead at

The Indians opened the third quarter with a 9-4 run, ending on a coast to coast run for two and then a trey by Manus for a 35-34 Towns lead. The Panthers responded with a trey and took advantage of a flurry of at least six turnovers by the Indians after that, however, in 1:45 mark which became 58-42 INDIANS AT UNION entering the fourth quarter.

Ryan Tallent sank two throws and contributed two put back baskets for six points during the third quarter. The Panthers opened the fourth quarter with a 7-0 run for a 65-42 lead by the 5:46 mark and successfully played keep away for most of the remainder of the game as they closed out a 65-46

red hot shooting at Union County

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The Towns County Lady Indians Varsity Basketball Team and their followers are accustomed to providing rousing scoring rallies such as was evident in their 44-14 closing run in just ten and a half min-utes against Dawson County following a 32-32 tie in their most recent game. It was to be the Union County Lady Panthers, however, who opened the game with red hot 3-point shooting in the Lady Indians' only contest of last week as the Lady Panthers used the opening salvo in taking a 61-48 victory over the Lady Indians.

The Union snapped a four game winning streak by the Lady Indians over the Lady Panthers. In fact, the Lady Indians had quite a dominant streak going as they had further won six of the last seven games between the two teams and thirteen of the last sixteen back to January, 2005.

The seventh ranked Lady Indians got Tuesday night off while the Indians traveled to Riverside Military Academy in Gainesville. The Lady Indians will themselves host two state ranked Class A teams from Atlanta, Holy Innocents' and defending state runner up Pace Academy, next month while the Indians are idle on those nights as a result of having the extra two Region 8A games against Riverside.

The Class A Lady Indians completed the 2011 portion of their regular season schedule with a 7-3 record with two of the losses being to third ranked Class AA power Rabun County, currently with an 8-0 record for this year and 35-2 for last year and this combined. The Lady Indians actually represent the two closest games for Rabun this year with the first game at Rabun being a two point game near the two minute mark in a twelve point loss and the Lady Indians being short handed in an eighteen point home court loss to the Lady Cats. Rabun and Union have combined for a 16-1 record to date with the loss being to the Lady Indians and each of the opponents having 3-0 records against Class AAA schools and higher.

The Lady Panthers entered the game against the Lady Indians with a 7-1 record which included a 52-44 loss to the Lady Indians just fourteen days prior. It was quite striking to realize that the forty points scored by Union the first half against champion Wesleyan. the Lady Indians emphasized the hot finish by the Lady Indians against Dawson County. As hot as they were the first half but in particular the first quarter, the Lady Panthers actually scored four fewer points in the sixteen minutes of the first half than the Lady Indians in the final ten and a half of the Dawson County game.

The Lady Panthers missed their first 3-point attempt but got two points out of the effort on a put back basket for a 2-0 lead just forty one seconds into the game. They





three different players combining to sink six straight treys as they built leads of 17-2 and then 22-6 with two free throws included late in the run.

The seven straight field goals and two for two free throw shooting by the Lady Panthers brought memories to some Lady Indian fans of their state tournament game against Pace Academy last year in the Towns County Gym. In that game, Pace sank thirteen of their first twenty field goal attempts for a 27-8 lead before cooling off and the Lady Indians fighting back for an early fourth quarter 45-44 lead, only to see the Lady Knights respond with eight straight field goals and four straight free throws with three treys included in taking a 69-54 victory. The Lady Knights went on to reach the Class A State Finals where they fell in an unexpectedly competitive game to perennial state

The first quarter of the Friday night game was pretty close to a mirror image of the earlier game between the Lady Indians and Lady Panthers. In that contest, the Lady Indians used six treys by three different players in taking a 21-12 first quarter lead which the Lady Panthers challenged but never overcame as the Lady Indians prevailed by the aforementioned 52-44 score.

A trey, a steal at mid court and old fashioned three point play, and a long deuce assists were Cochran with the final 2:53 of the quarter Lindsay Patton with 2.

followed up that basket with by Gabby Arencibia prevented disaster for the Lady Indians as they reduced the 22-6 margin to 24-14 by quarter's end. The Lady Indians have a long history of rousing comeback wins over the Lady Panthers and Union a few against the Lady Indians too but it wasn't to be on this night.

The Lady Panthers opened the second quarter with a 7-0 run for a 31-14 lead and led by a similar margin of 40-24 at intermission with Arencibia adding five points on a trey and a coast to coast run for a layup. Other than an early Union field goal, points were hard to come by for both teams for nearly two and a half minutes at the start of the third quarter before the Lady Indians made a move. Stephanie Patton fol-

lowed a trey by Arencibia at 5:34 with a coast to coast run for a three point play and then a trey to get the Lady Indians within single digits at 42-33 at the 3:47 mark. The Lady Panthers responded, however, with a long deuce, a trey, and an inside basket for a 49-33 lead and the Lady Indians could get no closer than 56-46 on an Eryn Cochran trey near the two minute mark of the fourth quarter as the Lady Panthers closed out a 61-48 victory.

Scoring leaders for the Lady Indians for the game were Arencibia with 16 points, Stephanie Patton with 13, Dadrian Blythe with 6, and Cochran with 3 while leaders in assists were Cochran with 3 and

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The Towns County Indian JV's Basketball Team traveled to Riverside Military Academy in Gainesville on Tuesday and to Union County on Friday of last week and played well in spurts but came up short in 55-29 and 57-38 losses to their respective opponents. Turnovers were especially costly in the early portions of the game at Riverside as the Eagles jumped out to such leads as 17-2 late in the first quarter an 30-6 by the minute and a half mark of the second. The win was the second of the year over the Class AA Lady Panthers for the Class A Lady Indians who won some two weeks earlier on their home

court by a 44-32 score. The Lady Panthers took a quick 3-0 lead on a trey just sixteen seconds into the game and, with the exception of three brief Lady Indian leads of one point each in the second and third quarters, led by mostly small margins until the Lady Indians began to turn the tables in the fourth quarter. Four different Lady Indians each put a field goal in the score book in the first quarter with Union
