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Lady Indians defeat Copper Basin and Union, take third in BOTS

The Towns County Lady Indians Varsity Basketball Team took a decisive opening night victory over Copper Basin in the twenty fifth annual Battle of the States Tournament last week and fell victim to a decisive victory by tournament champion Lumpkin County on Friday before rebounding for a hard fought victory over Union County on Saturday in taking the third place trophy.

The week's work leaves the Lady Indians with a 6-7 record against a very challenging schedule as they face mostly Region 8A opponents during the 2019 portion of their schedule with a trip to Hayesville on Saturday of this week and a home court battle with Fannin County later this month being the only non region games remaining on their

Lady Indians 58, Copper Basin (Tennessee) 33 – The Lady Indians entered the game against Copper Basin feeling most richly blessed by the fact that senior Taylor Cornett was available and unexpectedly ready to play after a serious auto accident the day before the game when her car was totaled by a head

The Copper Basin Lady Cougars entered the opening game against the Lady Indians with a 6-4 record and got off to a 6-2 start by the 4:51 mark of the first quarter only to see the Lady Indians strike for a 15-2 run for a 17-8 score which became 17-10 at quarter's end. Sophomores Kennedi Henson with seven points and Vanessa Floyd with six highlighted first quarter action for the Lady Indians who led 32-12 at intermission and 49-20 after three quarters on the way to a 58-33 victory.

Scoring highlights for the final three quarters included seven players entering the scoring column in the second quarter with Floyd and Henson again leading the way with four points each, six points on three deuces by senior Demya Allen and treys by Cornett and junior Sophia Shook in the third, and nine points on three treys by sophomore Jayce Young in the fourth.

Scoring leaders game for the Lady Indians were Floyd with 12 points, Henson and Young with 11 each, Allen with 9, Cornett with 7, and Shook with 5. Seven different Lady Indians contributed at least one assist with leaders being Henson with 4, Cornett with 3, and sophomore Remington Parker and Shook with 2 each.

Leading rebounders were Allen with 7, Henson with 6, Floyd with 5, sophomore Abby Mauldin with 4, and Cornett with 3. Junior Hailey Brackett led Copper Basin with 10 points.

Lumpkin County 56, Lady Indians 17 – For the second time this year, the Lady Indians faced a very difficult matchup when they faced the Class AAA Lumpkin County Lady Indians of Dahlonega who feature outstanding defense, athleticism, and outside shooting but especially strong ball handling which makes court pressure defense more

difficult. At any rate, the Lumpkin Ladies sprang out to a 14-0 lead and led at the quarter breaks by scores of 21-3, 36-11, and 49-17 on the way to a 56-17 victory.
