## Towns County's Leader In Sports

Towns County High School Indians junior Kolby Moss became just the fourteenth Indian known to reach the 1,000 career points club in basketball at TCĤS last Friday when he sank a second quarter free throw for his ninth point in the game in giving the Indians a 25-24 lead against the Providence Christian Academy Stars.

He had scored 209 points as a freshman, 509 as a sophomore, and 273 in eleven prior games this year for a total of 991 entering the Providence game.

This accomplishment is unique for Moss in at least two ways. First of all, he is the first Indian to reach 1,000 points as a junior since an evaluation of available records leads one to believe that the legendary 6'4" Bob Bryson reached the total as a junior during the 1955 season. This is based on the likelihood that Bryson would have easily reached the 274 points he would have needed as a sophomore, with the scorebook for that season being missing, between the 199 scored as a freshman and more than 527 as a junior with scoring totals for a few games missing at

the end of that season. Kolby's teammate as a freshman, Zach Davenport, missed by just three points, with 997, reaching 1,000 points as a junior the season prior to their becoming teammates for a year during the 2018 season.

Secondly, there is an excellent but unverifiable chance that Moss reached 1,000 points earlier than Bryson based upon research of Bryson's point totals in the first twelve games of his junior year which are available. He scored 267 points in the twelve games during the 1954 portion of the 1955 season with this being prior to his first game of 1955 as a junior on January 4, 1955.

When adding this total to the 199 points scored as a freshman for a total of 466 points, Bryson would have needed a pretty significant total of 534 points as a sophomore to have reached 1,000 prior to that date with Moss reaching the total on January 3, 2020.

The Moss surname has become synonymous with sports excellence in Towns County over so it surely comes as no surprise to long time followers of TCHS basketball that Kolby has become the latest member of the 1,000 point club. A mention of two close relatives of Kolby who had prominent careers at TCHS may

Although records of games played are very scarce, Kolby's father Keith Moss was a four year member of the Indians ending with his senior year of 1989. Score sheets for just a few a period of well over fifty years of Keith's games are available with the very first varsity game he appeared in as a freshman during the 1986 season being very notable. In the absence of starting center Jeff O'Dell due to injury, Keith came off the bench and contributed four points in the

third quarter and six in the fourth for ten points overall in a 54-49 loss to Hayesville in a Christmas tournament at Murphy on December 26, 1985.

Legendary TCHS basketball and baseball standout Kyle Moss is the great uncle of Kolby and he became the first Moss known at this time to play basketball at the school during the 1963 season. He scored 40 points as a freshman substitute before enjoying stardom as a starter during his sophomore, junior, and senior

seasons. He added 229 points as of Terry Gribble of the Class of a sophomore and very well may have reached 1,000 career points but with no means of verifying this as the scorebooks for his junior and senior seasons are not known to exist.

It will likely be of interest to readers to learn that Kyle was a TCHS teammate of Dwight Berrong, the grandfather of Kolby's fellow junior teammate Aidan requires not only a distinct talent Berrong. Their 1966 team defeated state ranked Lovett before falling by a single point in the Region 4B Tournament semi finals to state ranked Oconee County on Oconee's home court with Oconee being one of just eight teams from four regions making it to the state tournament that year and finishing as state runners up to Waynesboro.

In view of the innumerable accomplishments of the extended Moss family in basketball, it is a bit surprising for your reporter to realize that Kolby becomes only the sixth Moss or Moss descendant known to reach 1,000 points with this giving an idea of how significant it is to reach this career scoring total. The only other players with the Moss surname to reach this total have been Martha Moss (Hufstetler) during her junior season of 1978 and Jordan Moss during her senior season of 2011. The mother

1965, the grandmother of Keisha Taylor (O'Hearn) of the Class of 1997, and the grandmother of the aforementioned Zach Davenport of the class of 2018 carried the Moss name prior to marriage with Terry, Keisha, and Zach all reaching the 1,000 career points total.

Reaching 1,000 points to consistently put the ball in the basket but having the opportunity to play on a regular basis for at least three full years in most cases as well as remain relatively free of injury and illness. Often, a player capable of successful play as a freshman and sophomore may fall short of the opportunity due to a veteran presence on their team.

Congratulations upon reaching such a noteworthy milestone and best wishes in the future are extended to Kolby Moss from this reporter and the Towns County Herald. Much appreciation is also extended for the countless hours of dedication and hard work he and his teammates have provided in reaching most formidable individual and team successes. Followers of the Indians still have lots of time to view the exploits of Kolby and his teammates on the basketball court.

## Indians, Lady Indians lose tough battles at Hayesville, NC

Hayesville, NC - The Towns County Lady Indians and Indians varsity basketball teams traveled to Hayesville last Saturday following a decisive victory by the Lady Indians and a heartbreaking home court loss for the Indians on Friday against Region 8A foe Providence Christian Academy of Lilburn.

The Lady Indians would battle illness and an injury in Hayesville as they fell in a very competitive game to the home standing Yellow Jackets by a 46-37 score with the win over Providence and the loss to the Yellow Jackets giving them a 5-8 record. The Lady Jackets improved their record to 6-4 with the win over the Lady Indians.

A daunting weekend task continued on Saturday at Hayesville for the Indians after falling on the last shot of the game to Providence Christian who improved their record to 16-0 by defeating Athens Christian by a 68-55 score on Saturday. Hayesville would improve their record to 8-2 with a victory over the Indians not assured until during the final ten seconds of the game with one of their losses having been by a 67-64 score to the Indians in the Battle of the States Tournament and the other a 61-60 loss at Class AA Franklin. The Indians completed the week with an 8-5 record. Hayesville 46, Lady Indians 37 – Hayesville used a pair of treys in a game opening 8-2 run by the 5:07 mark of the first quarter interrupted only by a basket by junior Vanessa Floyd before the Lady Indians struck for six straight points on deuces by senior Sophia Shook, Floyd, and freshman Sarah Shook for an 8-8 tie at the 2:29 mark.

7-0 run for a 15-8 lead reduced to 15-10 at quarter's end by a pair of free throws by Floyd at 11.1 seconds. The second quarter would be a near standoff as junior Jayce Young sank a trey at 7:18 for just a 15-13 Lady Indians deficit but that would be the Lady Indians' last points of the quarter.

The Lady Jackets would not do much better, however, as they manage just a deuce off a Lady Indian turnover at the 4:30 mark and still another trey at 3:51 for a 20-13 lead at intermission. Junior Kennedi Henson not only was under the weather with an ear infection but missed much of the second quarter after an ankle injury early in the quarter which restricted her play while playing most of the remainder of the game.

A deuce and two free throws by Floyd prior to and a trey by Sophia Shook following two Lady Jacket free throws had the Lady Indians within 22-20 at the 5:25 mark of the third quarter before perhaps the turning point of the game occurred when most everyone but the officials saw a double dribble by the Lady Jackets.

48 - Following a heartbreaking home court loss on a trey far off target but caroming off the backexpired to Providence Christian on Friday night, the Indians could have been flat with not much resistance to the Yellow Jackets in Havesville. That would not be the case, however, as they battled Hayesville with everything they had in a game not clinched by the Jackets until within the final ten seconds of the game. The game against Providence featured seven ties and six lead changes with a similar four ties and four lead changes in the game against Hayesville. After Hayesville opened the game with 3-0 and 5-2 leads, the Indians struck for an 8-0 run for a 10-5 lead at the 2:56 mark. Sophomore Collin Crowder then more than matched a Yellow Jacket deuce with a trey for a 13-7 Towns lead at 1:23 but the Jackets sank a deuce and trey during the final minute of play for just a 13-12

## Indians lose heartbreaker to Providence; Lady Indians win with blowout

The Indians suffered a heartbreaking loss to a 14-0 Providence Christian Academy team on Friday, Jan. 3, just a week after winning Towns County's first Battle of the States Christmas Tournament.

Heading into Friday's game, Towns County was 8-3 and 1-0 in the region when the Storm traveled to Hiawassee.

Providence Christian scored first, and for much of the first quarter, the two teams took turns leading the game with four lead changes, but the Indians closed the quarter on top 16-13.

Junior Aidan Berrong started the scoring in the opening minutes of the second quarter, hitting back-to-back shots and a 3-pointer for the Indians. But the Storm continued to battle and removed a six-point Indian lead to tie the game at 24 midway through the second quarter.

After the Storm took a six-point lead, shots from sophomores Kyle Oakes, Collin Crowder and junior Kolby Moss helped the Indians regain the lead as the first half ended 34-33.

In the opening minutes of the third quarter, the Indians in-



creased their lead after Crowder put up seven points.

Following the Indians' win against Union County the previous Saturday, Moss only needed nine points to hit his 1,000th career point, and early amazing milestone thanks to two shots from the foul line.

The Indians ended the third quarter with a 50-44 lead over the Storm, though the Storm started the final quarter with a 6-0 run to tie the game at 50. After the Indians retook the lead, Crowder was forced to leave the

game due to a cut on his arm.

As Crowder received medical attention on the sidelines, the Storm took advantage and tied things up at 58 with just under a minute left to go in the game.
