Thomas McKean, hunted by the British, forced to move his family constantly, eventually keeping them in hiding and serving in Congress with no pay, lived thereafter in poverty.

The properties of William Ellery, Lyman Hall, George Clymer, George Walton, Button Gwinnett, Thomas Heyward Jr., Edward Rutledge and Arthur Middleton were looted by enemy soldiers and traitors.

During the Battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson, Jr. aware that British General Cornwallis had taken his home for head quarters, urged our General George Washington to decimate his own home with canon fire. Nelson later died bankrupt.

Francis Lewis' home and property were destroyed by the British and his wife being jailed, died soon after.

John Hart and his thirteen children were forced to flee from his dying wife's bedside. With all his property and gristmill destroyed he was forced to live in forests and caves, dur ing which time his children vanished.

This was merely the beginning of our perpetual fight for our unique Sovereign Republic that many today sadly take for granted. In this New Year, 2019, let us all renew our vigor, honor, respect and yes, love for those who gave, and continue to give so much for our nation. 

the forever war needs new enemies. Enter stage left, Russia and China.



**Radon Action Month** 

Radon is an invisible, odorless gas that causes lung cancer. Every 25 minutes someone dies from radon induced lung cancer, making it the second leading cause of lung cancer. During Radon Action Month this January,



UGA experts are advising you to test your home for radon gas. I'd like to talk about what this dangerous gas is, how you can find out if you have it, and what you can do to reduce the radon in your house to a safe level.

When uranium, which occurs naturally in Georgia soil and rock, breaks down, it produces radon gas. Radon is a heavy gas which seeps into homes from the ground and concentrates in the lower levels of a house. Radon can be present in any home, regardless of the age or type of home. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) estimates that about 6.7% of homes nationwide have elevated levels of radon gas; however, in some counties the levels are higher. Homes in north Georgia can have high levels of radon. In Union County, between March 2003 and July 2017, about 46.5% of the homes tested had elevated levels of radon. In Towns County it was 33.1%. An elevated level of radon is anything at, or above, 4 picocuries per liter (pCi/L). Being exposed to a level of 4 pCi/L has similar health effects as smoking 8 cigarettes per day.

The only way to know if your home has a high level of radon is to test for radon. Radon test kits are available from several sources, including local retailers, the Extension Office, and by ordering online at www.UGAradon.org. Purchasing a kit from the Extension office costs \$10.

If the radon level in your home is high, it is fixable. Installing a radon reduction (or radon mitigation) system will reduce high levels of indoor radon to acceptable levels. The system most commonly used is a vent pipe system, which includes a fan that pulls radon from beneath the house and vents it to the outside.

Just because your neighbor has had a negative radon test does not mean that your house isn't affected. Also, if your neighbor has had a positive test it doesn't mean that you have radon in your home. It is advisable to still test your own home. Experts usually advise that you have your home tested regularly to make sure that radon levels are low.

Radon may also be found in drinking water. This is primarily a concern for individuals whose drinking water comes from private wells. In Georgia, wells drilled into granitic crystalline rock aquifers (pretty common for wells around here). are at risk of naturally occurring radon contamination. This is where the uranium that decays to radon can be found at higher levels. If you don't know if there is radon in your well water, have the water tested. The UGA Agricultural and Environmental Services Laboratories in Athens tests water samples for the presence of radon. To get a water testing kit, contact your local Extension Office. Testing for radon in water costs \$40. For more information on radon, visit www.ugaradon.org. Radon can be a serious concern in our area. It's best to be tested to know if you have dangerous levels in your home.

#### Dear Editor.

One of my hobbies is measuring and recording rainfall in the Gumlog Valley where we live. In 2018 I measured 85.5 inches. The driest month was January with 2.0" and the wettest was May with 11.1".

The following data at our same location show how greatly rainfall has varied from year to year. There are also wide variations from area to area.

2008 (44.2"), 2009 (72.5"), 2010 (47.7"), 2011 (56.4") 2012 (50.0"), 2013 (87.0"), 2014 (54.3"), 2015 (79.3), 2016 (43.1"), 2017 (63.5") and 2018 (85.5").
