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Lady Indians win at Tallulah, fall at region leader Lakeview, Class AAAA Stephens

The youthful Towns County Lady Indians varsity basketball team continued an impressive season last week when they faced the unusual situation of seeing action on three consecutive nights due to the postponement of their game at Tallulah Falls from Tuesday to Wednesday and then Thursday due to snow. The only time during a season for the Towns County teams with games scheduled for three consecutive days is during the Battle of the States Tournament but with all teams involved in the tournament facing the three straight days circumstances.

The three Lady Indian opponents had combined for a total of twenty eight wins as they entered their games against the Lady Indians so continued the pattern of formidable opponents for the Lady Indians. They knocked off Tallulah Falls in a hard fought battle on Thursday, struggled to put points on the scoreboard for three quarters before finishing on a high note in a loss at Lakeview Academy on Friday, and took Class AAAA Stephens County to the final seconds before losing a close encounter on Saturday on their home court.

The Lady Indians finished the week with an overall 5-14 record, including 3-5 in Region 8A with a chance to finish in second place within Sub-Region 8A North, depending upon how the Lady Indians and Tallulah Falls fare in their remaining games. Lady Indians 45, Tallulah

Falls 40 – The Lady Indians had their way the last half in an early season home court 67-37 victory but the absence of the injured freshman Kennedi Henson this time and uncommon difficulty at the foul line would result in a hard fought Region 8A victory on Tallulah's home court on Thursday. The Lady Indians would not

score for more than four minutes at the start of the game but come on like gangbusters when they did as they struck for a 10-0 run between the 3:53 and 2:18 mark for a 10-3 lead on a steal and basket by junior Erika Spano, two treys by junior Taylor Cornett, and a coast to coast run by senior Madison McClure. Field goals by Spano and junior Kristen Byers would complete the Lady Indians' first quarter scoring for just a 14-13 lead at quarter's end when Tallulah sank a trey at

Lady Indians quickly disappeared at the start of the fourth quarter when two Tallulah treys in just thirty nine seconds got them a 34-34 tie at 7:21. Although we who were watching the game didn't know it at the time, there was no reason for alarm as a free throw by McClure, a trey by Shook, a drive for two points by McClure, and a basket by freshman Vanessa Floyd between just the 6:40 and 4:31 marks had the Lady Indians leading 42-34.

Two free throws by Mc-Clure at 2:50 more than matched one by Tallulah for a 44-35 Towns lead at 2:50 and following a Tallulah trey at 2:37, the Lady Indians went into a stall with Tallulah finally sending McClure to the foul line at 42.1 seconds where she made the first of two free throws for a 45-38 Lady Indians lead which became a 45-40 victory after a late Tallulah field goal.

The Lady Indians were led in scoring for the game by McClure with 13 points, Cornett and Shook with 10 each, and Byers with 6 while Cornett led in assists with 4 and was followed by McClure struck for treys by Cornett and Indians a 17-16 lead at 5:52 and a and Shook with 2 each. The game of last Friday would prove to be a struggle for the Lady Indians for three quarters, however, as cold shooting resulted in deficits such as 9-0 at the start and 15-5 at the end of the first quarter with things not improving much through the second and third quarters. A 5-0 Lady Indians run between 5:20 and 4:23 of the second quarter on a field goal by senior Madison McClure and a free throw and field goal by freshman Vanessa Floyd reduced a 20-5 Lakeview advantage to 20-10 but the Lady Lions led 24-11 at intermission.

Junior Taylor Cornett provided five points for the Lady Indians on two deuces and a free throw in the third quarter but the Lady Lions led 38-18 entering the fourth quarter when the Lady Indians came alive, never mounting a true threat for a victory but gaining something to build on from the game against a top flight opponent.

After the Lady Lions opened the fourth quarter with a trey for a 41-18 advantage, the Lady Indians McClure, two free throws each by junior Erika Spano and McClure,

Junior Kristen Byers then matched two Lakeview free throws with a deuce at 1:29 for a 50-36 score but the Lady Lions finished on an 8-2 run for a final margin of victory of 58-38. For readers who suspect that the Lady Lions cleared their bench in the fourth quarter in making it easier for the Lady Indians to go on their strong run, this was not the case as the Lady Lions not only used for the most part just six players throughout the game but used full court pressure during the final 8-2 run.

McClure led the Lady Indians in scoring with 12 points with other leaders being Cornett and Spano with 8 each and Floyd with 6. Byers, Cornett, junior Kenzlee Denton, and McClure each contributed 1 assist while Spano led in rebounds with 8 and was followed by Cornett with 5. Scoring leaders for the Lady Lions were sophomore Maddy Towles with 14 points, senior Tori Taylor with 13, and junior Savannah Kinsey

The Lady Lions completed the week with a 13-8 overall record, including 9-1 in the region with this placing them in first place by half a game over the Prince Avenue Christian School Lady Wolverines who were upset by Athens Academy on Friday night by a 51-44 score. The loss left Prince with an 8-1 region record included in a 17-2 overall record at week's end. Lady Indians fans will recall that Athens Academy, with a current 17-3 overall record and 7-2 in Region 8A prevailed by just a 46-43 score over the Lady Indians in Hiawassee back on January 6.

Henson is not only the tallest Lady Indian but was their leading scorer in eleven games up to the time of her injury with a 13.0 points per game average and a strong ball handler, defender, and rebounder as well.

The Stephens County ladies entered the game with a 9-10 record against, like the Lady Indians, a quite challenging schedule but destined for a tough battle from start to finish against the Towns ladies. Stephens would lead throughout the first quarter with the exception of a game tying Lady Indian runner by senior Madison McClure for a 2-2 score at 7:27. Two free throws by sophomore Sophia Shook had the Lady Indians within 10-7 with 58.8 seconds left but a free throw and putback basket by Stephens had them ahead 13-7 after one

37.8 seconds, however, for a 36-35 lead entering the fourth quarter they would not relinquish. It is not out of the question to believe that a fatigue factor may have been present for the Lady Indians in the fourth quarter after two road trips plus two games and three quarters of playing time in three days compared to two road trips for Stephens but just one game and three quarters of playing time in two days. At any rate, cold shooting and uncommon turnovers by the Lady Indians would allow Ste-

phens to open the quarter with a 13-4 run interrupted only by four for four free throw shooting by Mc-Clure at the 1:25 mark. The never say die Lady Indians were still not through, however, as a deuce by Floyd at 1:10, two free throws by McClure at 46.3 seconds, and a basket by Spano at twenty one seconds gave the Lady Indians a 6-1 run and just a 50-45 deficit.

The Lady Indians then came up with a steal and got off a quick trey attempt for a potential two points deficit around the sixteen seconds mark but the shot was partially blocked by Stephens, leaving them the final victory margin of 50-45 when they missed two free throws at 11.6 but with the Lady Indians not able to dent the scoreboard in the final seconds.

Scoring leaders for the game for the Lady Indians were Mc-Clure with 19 points, Shook with 9, Floyd with 7, and Spano with 6 while junior Taylor Cornett led in assists with 3. Rebounding leaders were Floyd with 6, McClure with 5, and junior Kristen Byers and Spano with 3 each. Senior Tykia Thompson led Stephens with 15

The Lady Indians must be given credit for a return to free throw shooting excellence in this game. After sinking just nine of twenty five attempts but escaping with a win at Tallulah and an improvement at Lakeview to fourteen for twenty four accuracy, they missed their first attempt against Stephens but sank their last fifteen in a row after that. The Stephens Ladies are surely impressed by the Lady Indians usually very accurate tempts in the season opening game between the two teams.

Indians overwhelmed at Tallulah Falls, play well but fall at Lakeview Academy

The Towns County Indians varsity basketball team got discouraging news last week when they learned after x-rays and a medical exam that senior inside power player Logan Cowart is not yet ready for a return to basketball action with his next evaluation scheduled for three weeks later which will be during the week of the Region 8-A tournament in Commerce.

The continued absence of Cowart was to be compounded by uncommon first half foul trouble for senior scoring leader Zach Davenport in both games played by the Indians on Thursday and Friday of last week. The Thursday game was necessitated by snow delays at first from Tuesday to Wednesday and then to Thursday when the very cold weather kept the snow around for an extra day.

The Indians did not play on Saturday when the Lady Indians hosted Stephens County as this was a game played to balance the schedule for the Lady Indians and Indians in view of Region 8-A foe Riverside Military Academy not having a

ans 47 – The Indians got a 5-0 lead less than a minute into the first quarter at Tallulah Falls on Thursday on a trey by junior Trent Bradshaw and a deuce by Davenport and they were within 13-11 on a basket by freshman Kolby Moss at 3:05 of the quarter not long before Davenport's being charged with his second foul and coming out of the game for the remainder of the quarter at the 2:30 mark.

Davenport had scored six of the Indians' eleven points to that point and Tallulah quickly took advantage of his absence



Tallulah would continue the onslaught for a 44-21 lead at intermission and a 68-33 advantage after three quarters on the way to an 81-47 victory.
