## Henson lost to injury, Lady Indians win one of three games last week

Both heartbreak and success were present last week for the Towns County Lady Indians varsity basketball team but with the heartbreak far overriding the success.

The heartbreak comes as a result of junior Lady Indian standout Kennedi Henson being lost for the remainder of the season due to a dreaded torn ACL in her knee suffered early in the second quarter of her team's game at Lakeview Academy on Tuesday.

Surgery is planned for this week and a lengthy recovery period will be required but Henson has expressed that she plans to return to sports action as an outstanding basketball and softball player.

This is not the first time for Henson to incur this unfortunate event as she suffered the same injury to the same knee during the Battle of the States tournament in 2017 during her freshman year with the Lady Indians. As at the time of the injury in 2017, there was little if any physical contact with another player but what might be described then as now as a freak type of injury.

Prayers and best wishes are extended to Kennedi from this reporter and the *Towns* County Herald for successful surgery and a safe, rapid, and complete recovery.

Henson's loss came as not only a devastating event for her but at a disappointing time for her team as they had showed much improvement in recent games with four wins and three strong challenges to opponents beginning with their final game in the Battle of the States Tournament which included perhaps their most impressive appearance of the year in a win over Commerce in their most recent prior game.

The game when Henson was injured against a senior laden Lakeview Academy team proved to be very difficult but the Lady Indians were in contention against Prince Avenue until the closing seconds on Friday and they got a decisive win over Andrews on Saturday without Henson's presence.

The Lady Indians kicked things off with an 8-0 run against the Lady Bears, forcing Summit Charter to call an early timeout.


