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BOE to adjust 2018-2019 school calendar for construction

The Towns County Board of Education will be making changes to the upcoming school calendar due to summer construction.

The board discussed these changes during the regular work session on Wednesday, Feb. 7.

Over the last two years, Towns County Schools have been working on renovating and modernizing facilities, from academics to athletics and everything in between.

These renovations have included work on the tennis court, baseball locker room, the purchase of a school system tractor, handicap parking spaces for football, baseball and soccer games, a sign for the middle school gym and auditorium, the purchase of Chromebooks and textbook adoptions – all of which have been funded through SPLOST.

This summer, the school will be pursuing another renovation endeavor, to replace the roof of the middle and high school.

During the renovations, all desks, computers, smart boards and any other valuable or non-expendable item will have to be removed from the classrooms and either taken home with the teachers, if personal items, or moved to the Towns County Middle School and Towns County Elementary School gyms until construction has been completed.

"They're taking the roof off, but it's not like there's not going to be anything above you when they do it," said Dr. Darren Berrong, Towns County Schools Superintendent. "There is a metal base, but it's not waterproof. If it rains, it is going to drip and leak.

"So, if we leave electronics in these classrooms, they're probably going to get destroyed, so teachers are going to have to take all of their personal stuff home.

"This is going to be a huge endeavor, and it's going See *BOE*, *Page* 6A

Path cleared for Hiawassee Franchise Fee Ordinance

Hiawassee Mayor Liz Ordiales introduced a revised version of the Blue Ridge Mountain EMC Franchise Fee in the Feb. 6 regular meeting of the Hiawassee City Council.

The council voted unanimously to hold the first reading of the ordinance, though Councilwoman Anne Mitchell was ill and could not make the meeting.

Mitchell has expressed support for the measure in the past.

As previously reported, the mayor has been looking for a way to lessen the impact of the fee on the hospital and other large electric customers within the city limits, and she recently suggested a potential cap on the amount to be collected. In order to avoid complex accounting issues, Ordiales decided that, instead of a cap, she would decrease the fee from 4 percent to 3 percent of gross electric sales based on kWh usage.

the ordinance in an upcoming council meeting, the fee will go into effect sometime this summer and will appear as a line item on the EMC utility bills of Hiawassee customers.

The money collected by the EMC and turned over to the City of Hiawassee will be used to improve lighting and other moving forward, according to Mayor Ordiales. Originally, the city passed a similar ordinance in August of last year, though public opinion swayed a majority of the council to repeal the ordinance in December 2017. In light of the recent franchise fee public hearing held in November, the council declined to schedule another See Hiawassee, Page 6A
