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## **Indians defeat Lincoln County 15-5, fall to Riverside 9-6 at home**

The Towns County Indians got redemption against Lincoln County on Feb. 27, winning 15-5 in their home opener last Wednesday, following a 6-1 loss to the Raiders in the season opener on the road two weeks prior.

Seth Fullerton started on the mound that Wednesday after throwing a no-hitter against Liberty County in Savannah on Feb. 23. It was familiar territory for the senior player, as he started on the mound in the Feb. 14 game against Lincoln County.

Senior Brett Denton got things started quickly, as he hit the first pitch thrown down right center for a single. The Indians scored four runs in the first inning and ended up going through their whole lineup.

Fullerton only allowed one run in the first inning and pitched into the fourth, but Head Coach Shannon Floyd made a call to the bullpen for Indians closer senior Devyn Burrell after Fullerton walked two in the fourth with one


Towns County had another run in the sixth to tie the game, but the Eagles wound up with three more runs in the seventh.


