## After 21 years, Mayor Mathis says she'll be retiring soon

Earlier this week, Hiawassee Mayor Barbara Mathis said that she would be retiring before the end of her term this year.

She addressed her retirement amid the swirling of local rumors.

"There's too many rumors out here," said Mayor Mathis when reached for comment over the weekend. "People are saying that I've retired, that I am retiring, that I'm going to retire by (March) 21st – I haven't set a date yet. I have no date yet."

Added Mayor Mathis: "When I decide to retire, I will be announcing it. I am going

to retire, but I have not set a date yet."

And though she has yet to set a date, the mayor did say that she would be retiring sometime in the next two months.

On Monday, the mayor signed a document authorizing Hiawassee City Councilwoman and Mayor Pro Tem Liz Ordiales to:

"Negotiate contracts with third parties for the provision of services to the City of Hiawassee, including but not limited to, code enforcement, building inspections, website and social media services, landscaping and lawn maintenance services, cleaning services, trash pickup services, demand services for the maintenance and repair

of the city's water and sewer systems, and any other third party with which the city desires to do business."

Furthermore, Mayor Pro Tem Ordiales "may obtain bids for proposals


## Hiawassee Post Office to become one-way from Main Street

The Hiawassee Post Office will soon feature a one-way entrance from Main Street, with a one-way exit out the back of the lot toward Ingles, expected by the end of this week.

The Georgia Department of Transportation is supplying the city with four DO NOT ENTER signs, two to stop people from turning onto Main Street from the post office, and two for the turn-in from Ingles.

This new one-way traffic flow will stop residents from exiting the post office onto Main Street, but will allow them instead to access multiple exits from the Ingles parking lot, including from the Ingles Gas Station, the street between the gas station and The Fire Place store, at Bell Street, or

over to the traffic light at River Street.

Making the post office a one-way drive from Main Street to Ingles is a project that's been in the making for a year and a half.

## Elections board holds precinct consolidation meeting

A major change to be implemented by the Towns County Board of Elections met with mixed reviews during a public hearing held by the board last week.

The idea is simple – consolidate Towns County's four voting precincts down to just one.

Such a change would eliminate the Young Harris, Macedonia and Tate City voting precincts, and everyone would vote at the Towns County Civic Center, which is where Hiawassee voters are used to voting.

YOUNG HARRIS – After months of deliberation and research regarding a Young Harris College expansion, the Young Harris City Council finally made steps toward a resolution during the monthly meeting on Tuesday, March 7.

Several months ago, the city attempted to receive an exemption from the county pertaining to an YHC expansion of housing facilities for on-campus students. Former Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall refuted the request, explaining that the exemption could
