Towns County avoided its second straight Region 8-A sweep by taking the final contest of last week's three-game set vs. Lincoln County

The Indians erased a 6-1 second-inning deficit with two in the bottom half of the frame and six in the third en route to

During Tuesday's series opener in Lincolnton, Towns County couldn't protect a 5-0 lead, eventually falling 6-5 via a seventh-inning walk-off single with two away in a tie

The series moved to Hiawassee on Friday, where the Indians were on the business end of a Red Devils' 2-hitter during a 7-1 loss in the first game of the doubleheader. The Indians host Lake
