School taxes won't be going up this year, says Superintendent Berrong

Despite an increased 2020 proposed budget, Towns County Schools Superintendent Dr. Darren Berrong said that he feels confident school property taxes will not be going up this

Berrong discussed the budget in the April 8 work session of the Towns County Board of Education, which occurred at the Board Office.

He said that taxes will not be going up despite statemandated pay raises of \$3,000 for all teachers and other qualifying school employees, plus a 2% pay raise for all state

Including the pay raises, the school system's 2020 proposed budget will be roughly \$700,000. This is about \$175,000 higher than last year's

the proposed budget will be advertised in the Towns County Herald the week of April 22, with the first occurring before the May 6 work session and the second in June.

Following two readings, the final budget is expected to be approved in the June 10 school board meeting.

Schools Finance Director Myra Underwood updated the board on the financial health of the system in the April 8 work

"The General Fund for the month of March was \$3,000 under budget, but compared to March of last year, we were actually up \$9,000," said Underwood. "For the year, for the (E-LOST fund), we have collected \$1.2 million, and it is up from budget \$214,000. From last year, it's still up

Public hearings on SPLOST account year-to-date is \$1.2 million. The difference in budget compared to actual is \$206,000, and the difference from this year to last year is

"If we keep going as we are, unless something major happens to the economy, we should definitely meet budget and actually be over budget on our sales tax.

"Through April, we have collected \$5,763,069 (in property taxes). We budgeted \$5,753,240, so we have met budget. Everything going forward will be over, and compared to this time last year, our property tax was \$82,000 Our revenue is

beginning to come in, so now you can see we have basically received 80%, because we have now received the majority of our property tax. And our Added Underwood, "The expenditures are at 66% of the

City unveils new Hiawassee Water Department rates for residential customers

Due to old debt and negative operating revenues, the City of Hiawassee Water Department's residential customers will experience a rate increase for the first time in six years, starting with their June water bills.

Inside the city limits, the rate will be increasing from \$19.27 per 1,000 gallons to \$24.67 per 1,200 gallons, which is an increase in the base amount of water for all
