Travis Tritt tour bus sideswiped in fatal | Defendant in delayed child collision on way to Hiawassee show

rape case set to be tried this summer

The tour bus of Country Music star Travis Tritt was involved in a fatal accident on Saturday, May 18, as Tritt made his way to Hiawassee on his Outlaws & Renegades Tour.

Two people died and one person was injured in the early morning accident that occurred after Tritt departed from a show at the House of Blues in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina.

Tritt reported on social media that he and his crew were fine.

"We were just involved in a fatal accident with a driver going the wrong way on Veteran's Highway as we were leaving Myrtle Beach," said Tritt on Twitter. "Thank God we are all okay.

"I feel so bad for those who died needlessly tonight. I'm really shaken up by what I witnessed. God bless those who died.

"We sustained minor

damage as we tried to avoid the crash site in front of us. Bus damage can be fixed, but lives cannot be replaced. I'm so incredibly sad for those who lost their lives tonight.

"I'm told that two people were killed in tonight's accident as the result of someone who was obviously driving drunk or impaired. Just a sober reminder

to everyone to never drive if you've been drinking or impaired in any way. Uber or Lyft is just a phone call away.

"I beg everyone to please, please, please drive sober. Know when to admit that you are too impaired to drive.

The victim in a nearly seven-year-old case of alleged child rape might finally see justice when her accused rapist goes on trial this summer.

Paul Jason Brothers is scheduled to appear in a July 29 specially set trial, where he will face charges that he raped and molested a 14-year-old local girl, who is now 21, back in 2012

Brothers was originally indicted by a Towns County Grand Jury in 2013, but his case has been long delayed due to the legal maneuverings of his criminal defense attorney, David Ralston.

Ralston is speaker for the Georgia House of Representatives, and he found himself in hot water earlier this year over renewed criticism of his alleged abuse of the socalled legislative leave law.

Stemming from a joint investigation by The Atlanta

Journal-Constitution and Channel 2 Action News in February, Ralston has faced continued bipartisan calls to step down as House speaker.

The lawyer-legislator is accused of using a state law he helped to expand as a Georgia lawmaker in 2006 to delay several of his clients' criminal cases for years by repeatedly asserting legislative duties on scheduled court dates.

Ralston continues to defend himself, however, saying he has done nothing wrong in applying the law, though his many critics remain vigilant in their fight to oust the embattled lawmaker.

In the Brothers case, Ralston is accused of submitting at least eight legislative leave form letters over the years, which has kept his client from experiencing a determination of guilt or innocence.

As pointed out by AJC reporter Johnny Edwards, this particular delay tactic has proven useful for getting clients

largely off the hook, as cases sometimes become too old to be tried effectively.

And though Ralston has refused to step down following the AJC/Channel 2 coverage, he has decided to begin wrapping up some of his old cases, including that of Brothers.

Young Harris traffic stop results in felony drug arrest
