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Towns County Youth Football League signups begin this weekend

Kids who played last year will not need to provide copies of their birth certificates

For all players, a onetime payment of \$90 will be required at the time of signup in order to cover costs of playing during the season, including insurance, a game jersey that kids will get to keep at the end of the season, and a trophy at the end-of-year banquet.


