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# Nobody hurt in Heathers Cove propane explosion

A propane explosion rocked a quiet lakefront neighborhood off Cedar Cliff Road the evening of Wednesday, June 28.

Fortunately, no one was hurt in the blast, which occurred in a home on Heathers Cove Road.

The explosion was determined to be an accident, though the exact nature of the blast was still under

investigation at press time. Towns County Fire Chief Harold Copeland credits the swift actions of first responders for securing the scene and getting the subflooring fire under control.

The homeowners were there at the time, along with some contractors remodeling the home, though no one was in the parts of the home affected by the explosion, which caused extensive sheetrock damage and structural damage to rafters.

"The damage was from the basement to the main floor, more toward the left side of the house," said Chief Copeland. "Nobody was hurt, thank goodness. We got on the scene and secured the propane tank.

Tanker 1, Engine 6 and Ladder 6 responded. We had a hydrant within probably 50 feet of our attack engine, though minimal water was used.

"It was just an explosion and a fire in the subflooring. Our guys got on it and knocked it out, then we monitored it for hotspots for quite a while and made sure there was nothing smoldering."

The chief commends the excellent work of his firefighters, including inside suppression

Chief Copeland also extends a special thank you to Towns County Sheriff's Deputy Mason Schuknecht for assisting in making an immediate evacuation of the home.

"It was another one of those deals where the Lord was with us," said Chief Copeland, looking back on the event.

## Chamber ready for Aug. 21 eclipse tailgate party

On Monday, Aug. 21, all of North America will be treated to an eclipse of the sun. Anyone within the path of totality can see one of nature's most awe-inspiring sights – a total solar eclipse.

In a total solar eclipse, the sun's outer atmosphere can be seen. The brighter stars and the planets come out. Animals change their behavior. Birds and squirrels nest. Cows return to the barn. Crickets chirp. There is a noticeable drop in both light level and air temperature. It is an eerie

This path, where the moon will completely cover the sun and the sun's tenuous atmosphere, the corona, can be seen. It will stretch from Lincoln Beach, Oregon to Charleston, South Carolina. The path of totality is a relatively thin ribbon, around 70 miles wide, which will cross the United States from West to East.

The first point of contact will be at Lincoln Beach, Oregon at 9:05 a.m. PDT. Totality begins there at 10:16 a.m. PDT. Over the next hour and a half, it will cross through Oregon, Idaho, Wyoming, Montana, Nebraska, Iowa,

#### Towns man dies in one vehicle crash on Hightower

A 51-year-old Hiawassee man died in a one-vehicle crash June 14 in the Hightower Community. Gregory John Berrong

died from injuries sustained in the crash. He had been transported to Northeast Georgia Medical Center, according to Georgia State Patrol crash reports.

The accident happened at 6:13 p.m. when Berrong lost control of the blue, 1999 Chevrolet truck he was driving

westbound on Georgia 2. The vehicle left the roadway, struck an embankment and overturned. Berrong was totally ejected from the vehicle, patrol reports show.

No other persons or vehicles were involved in the crash, patrol reports show.

Funeral services for Berrong were held June 17, from the chapel of Banister Funeral Home in Hiawassee.

Interment followed at Upper Hightower Cemetery.

Banister Funeral Home had charge of the arrangements.
