# 'Memory Lane' museum to display classic cars for charity

YOUNG HARRIS -After giving rise to the motel industry, the suburbs, the interstate highway system and other pillars of 20thcentury America, the classic automobile will now bolster Towns County's economy and local tourism in 2020 and

Last week, local philanthropists Jerry and June Smith brought three truckloads of classic cars to Towns County High School to give the community a preview of

And later this month, the Smiths will launch the Memory Lane Classic Car Museum, located next door to Fieldstone Cinemas Six at the former site of Fun World.

The museum will house approximately 100 classic cars, hot rods, motorcycles and more, with galleries alternating weekly from among the Smiths

than 160 automobiles.

Available in the museum are actor Burt Reynolds' 1978 Pontiac Firebird Trans Am from the movie "Hooper," with the hood and dash autographed by Reynolds himself; former NASCAR driver Richard Petty's 1969 Ford Torino; and many other classic cars.

According to Towns County Sole Commissioner Cliff Bradshaw, the museum will provide a much-needed nitro boost to local tourism following the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic that has already claimed the Blairsville Scottish Festival, the Georgia Mountain Fair and other community

"This is going to have a tremendous impact on tourism and the entire area, but most importantly, we're gaining two very valuable friends, Bradshaw said. "(Jerry and June Smith) are wonderful people that want to give back to the community.

Originally from Stone Mountain, Jerry Smith comes to Towns County by way of Eatonton, where he operated another auto museum in the Lake Oconee region.

Following a short break from the vintage car business, Jerry acknowledged that he could no longer ignore his two life callings: classic cars and compassion. When the museum opens to the public, all proceeds will benefit local charities, he

'Admission will be \$5, with 12-and-under free," he said. "And 100 percent of the proceeds will go to charities in Towns and Union Counties.

#### Early in-person voting for Aug. 11 primary runoffs started Monday

Advanced in-person voting for the Aug. 11 Republican and Democratic Primary Runoff Elections began Monday and will continue through Friday, Aug. 7.

Early voting takes place

weekdays between 8:30 a.m. Congressional District. and 4:30 p.m. at the Towns County Board of Elections & Registration Office located in Suite A of 67 Lakeview Circle in Hiawassee next to the courthouse.

Voters can cast ballots even during lunchtime, though importantly, there is no required Saturday scheduled for weekend early voting due to the runoff nature of the election.

The election features four runoff contests that were undecided in the June 9 General Primary, including three races to decide Republican nominees for the offices of Towns County Sheriff, District 50 State Senator and U.S. Representative in the 117th Congress from the 9th Congressional District; and one Democratic race for 9th

For Towns County Sheriff, Kenneth "Ode" Henderson is squaring off against Daren "Bear" Osborn for the Republican nomination, with the Aug. 11 runoff winner currently being set to appear unchallenged on the Nov. 3 General Election ballot

For District 50 State Senator, Republicans Stacy Hall and Bo Hatchett are vying for their party's nomination, with the Aug. 11 runoff winner also set to appear unchallenged by party opposition in November.

For the 9th Congressional District race, on the Republican side are Matt Gurtler and Andrew Clyde, while the Democratic ticket features Devin Pandy and Brooke Siskin. Whoever See Early Voting, Page 6A
