Indians begin football practice this week; season opens Aug. 17 at Hayesville

While the status of Towns County's Saturday scrimmage at Banks County is still up in the air (as of Monday's deadline), you can guarantee that pads will be popping Wednesday - the Georgia High School Association's official start of padded practices. Another sure bet is the

direction of the Indians football program under Head Coach John Cornett. In two seasons, Cornett has guided Towns County to eight wins - the most of any TCHS coach in their first two seasons.

In fact, Cornett is two wins

away from passing Gary Bell for the third most coaching victories in school history. In second is Hosea Collins with 16 wins; Kyle Langford is first with 17. Following next week's scrimmage with Lumpkin County,

Cornett will have his first shot at tying Bell when the Indians open the season Aug. 17 at Hayesville, Towns County will look to improve to 3-0 vs the Yellow Jack-

ets under Coach Cornett. Prior to Cornett's arrival, Hayesville had won 20 of the 21 meetings with their cross-lake rival. The only Indians' victory came in 2009 by a score of 48-12. Following a bye week,

Towns County welcomes Union County for the home opener on

The Panthers haven't visited Hiawassee since 2014 - a 57-14 Union victory. Game two will also mark the first taste of the



Towns - Union rivalry for Cornett, contests. who looks to flip the script as he did with Hayesville.

Like the Yellow Jackets rivalry prior to Cornett, the Indians have only defeated the Panthers once (1993) in 30 tries.

The final non-region matchup takes place Sept. 7 when the Indians host Andrews, NC.

The Indians and Wildcats haven't met since 2006 - a 26-0 Andrews victory. Towns is 1-5 alltime vs the Wildcats with the win coming in 2003 by a 14-7 score.

Region play opens on Sept. 14 with a trip to George Walton. The Indians are 0-4 vs the Bulldogs but have narrowed the Sept. 21 vs Athens Academy. Last season, the Indians fell

53-13 to the seventh ranked Spartans - marking the fourth meeting between Towns County and a ranked Athens Academy squad. In the 16 previous meetings with the Spartans, the closest result was a 28-13 Indians loss in 1983.

New hunting seasons and regulations guide available

Now online and in print, the 2018-2019 Georgia Hunting Seasons and Regulations Guide is available, announces the Georgia Department of Natural Resources' Wildlife Resources Division. This guide provides important information on season dates, bag limits, hunting licenses, wildlife management areas, quota hunts, youth opportunities and much more. You may view, download and print the guide at georgiawildlife.com/hunting/regulations. Pick up a printed copy at Wildlife Resources Division offices and license vendors throughout

Some of the major changes to the hunting regulations this year include: Non-resident Youth

Sportsman's License: This annual license can be purchased by nonresident youth through age 15. It includes privileges for all Hunting and Fishing, including Big Game and Trout (not the Quota Alligator Harvest Permit).

Baiting: Deer may be hunted over or near any bait on private lands in all counties.


New Public Hunting Opportunities: Several new properties will be available. including Gaither WMA (Newton County), Ohoopee Dunes WMA-6,000+acres (Effingham County); Bullard Creek WMA-491 acres (Jeff Davis County) and several new VPA properties. More at georgiawildlife.com/allwmas.
