

We Must Learn to Work Together Dear Editor,

I would like to thank the writer of last week's letter to the editor "In Response to: What Will Hiawassee's Legacy Be?" He is obviously very passionate about our environment, and that is a good thing. I believe we all want to pass on a better, cleaner, healthier earth to our children. I hope that we, as a country and as a world, can make the right choices that assures that this will happen. To do that, we must make good decisions based on the best of scientific data. Respect Lake Chatuge

Dear Editor, Many Towns County residents have noticed the seaplane on Lake Chatuge on weekends. The southwest corner of the lake effectively has become an airport runway where a commercial sightseeing service takes off and lands all day long most Saturdays and Sundays. Hiawassee is promoted online as a "seaplane base," so more seaplanes may come. The Gainesville seaplane company says that its pilots are licensed and follow boating rules while on the water. That is not enough. The commercial flights take off and land at the busiest times for boat traffic on a narrow inlet where there are many vulnerable users such as kayakers, paddleboarders, fishermen/women, and swimmers, including children swimming from docks. Multiple seaplane flights are also a sound nuisance. The drone of the plane's engine echoes off the mountains and sounds much louder than boats. Seaplanes are not allowed on some lakes, and common-sense restrictions apply on others to respect boaters and residents. Indeed, even seaplane advocates seeking access on Lake Lanier support reasonable guidelines.
