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Cross Country: Boys place fourth, girls place fifth at Saturday's State Championship

CARROLLTON-Towns County Cross Country brought 2019 to a close with a pair of Top Fives at the Class A Public State Championships on Saturday, Nov. 2, at Carrollton High School.

With 94 points, the Towns County boys finished in Fourth Place, just two points behind third and three points out of second.

Junior Liam King paced the Indians with an Eighth-Place finish, clocking in at 18:31. Junior Jensen Brown just missed a Top 10, placing 11th with a time of

Commerce ran away with First Place, placing three runners in the Top Five to finish with 38

"I hate coming in fourth when I know we could have finished second," Towns County Head Coach Tim Rosser said. "Only three points separated second and fourth, and we got the short end of the stick. We just needed to pass a few more guys and we weren't able to.

"Nobody was going to beat Commerce today, they were farand-away better than everyone here. We thought coming in that we might have something for them, but not today.'

The Towns County girls just missed a spot on the podium, placing fifth with 146 points – 27 points back of Telfair County's finish at third. Leading the way for Towns

was sophomore Alison Markham, who turned in a time of 24:06 to finish 18 seconds out of ninth and 11 seconds better than 11th.

With two young squads, last weekend's performances provide solid foundations for Coach Rosser as the program builds toward a return to State Championship contention.
