In 1986, some 32 years ago, Linda Reed-Smith received her first miniature house as a birthday present from a close friend and co-worker at Lanier Business Products in Marietta.

'The little house was a little lonely, so I added a tree, said Reed-Smith. "And then it needed some people, so I added people. And then they needed neighbors. And then the rest is history.

"I started getting them as birthday presents, Christmas presents, and I bought probably 80 percent of them. Ninety percent of them are Department 56 or Colonial Village, which is Department 56's competition.'

## Sheriff's Office arrests aggravated assault and drug suspect

YOUNG HARRIS - The Towns County Sheriff's Office, with assistance from the Union County Sheriff's Office and Hiawassee Police Department, arrested an aggravated assault and drug suspect at a residence on Sampson Road in Young Harris on Sunday, Nov. 25.

The suspect has been identified as Christopher Steven Ray, 34, of Murphy, North Carolina, and he was arrested on outstanding warrants from Towns, Union and Gordon counties

Resulting from his arrest, investigators seized \$5,000 worth of methamphetamine, illegal Schedule IV and

Schedule II drugs, drug-related objects and cash.

Towns County investigators have charged Ray with trafficking in methamphetamine, possession of methamphetamine,

possession of methamphetamine with intent to distribute, possession of Schedule IV drugs, possession of Schedule II drugs, possession of drugrelated objects, and obstruction of law enforcement officers.

Investigators also served warrants on Ray from a previous encounter with him that occurred in Towns County earlier this year on Sept. 6, including warrants for possession of methamphetamine, three counts obstruction of law enforcement officers, and two counts possession of Schedule IV drugs.

The Gordon County Sheriff's Office had outstanding warrants on Ray for aggravated assault on a law enforcement
